Free Enterprise Hog Producers of Ontario

Whereas it has become more obvious to more producers that the present marketing plan in its compulsory form is inefficient, costly and detrimental and unacceptable to thinking producers not only in Ontario but across Canada;

And whereas the present plan had led to favoritism and discrimination, collusion and corruption, mistrust, resentment and bitterness, there can be no hope of an early settlement or a satisfactory solution under the present circumstances.

And whereas the present set-up is by now a proven failure and a stumbling-block in the path of progressive marketing;

Therefore it is resolved that the free enterprise Hog Producers of Ontario, strongly urge that this controversial issue be brought to an immediate end either by rejecting the compulsory powers of the present board or by an immediate vote of the producers, so the way can be open for a new deal for the harassed Hog Producers of Ontario.

It can no longer be tolerated or made acceptable to the F.P.M.B. — the producers — and people everywhere.

And whereas the Hog Producers of Ontario have been subjected for 14 years or so to a plan forced on them without the authority of a proper vote;

And whereas the Hog Producers of Ontario cannot be expected to continue to be the guinea-pig for more rounds of wrangling over auction selling or other petty details which can only lead to more confusion and the same inevitable results;

Criticizes Council For Delay in Paying Accounts

"It seems strange that we have so many accounts due in December carried over into January," commented councillor Chas. Hooper at Monday's meeting of Markham Twp. council. "If the 1960 council had a deficit they should have admitted the amount and not covered it up by putting accounts ahead into January," he said.

Councillor Hooper who was newly-elected this year, proceeded to question a telephone bill of over \$700. "At this rate we must be paying about \$10,000 a year for phones," he commented. Clerk Crisp replied that the bill was for December and January. "You know the reasons very well, as they've been discussed three times in committee," said deputy-reeve Mumberson. He said he would take any blame there was for increased phone costs and he hoped at the same time he could share in the credit for better service. He said that three years ago the lines were party lines and residents had to wait a long time to get through. "The cost was small but the service was nil," he said. Reeve Dean stated that the annual cost for telephone service was about \$4,000 a year.

Plan Spring Opening For York Manor Home For The Aged

According to the latest information released by York County Council, the new York Manor Home for the Aged will be completed and ready for occupancy by May 1, 1961.

Tenders for equipment have been advertised with the closing date set for January 31. These tenders will include bed-room, infirmary, dining-room, board room, lounge, reception room, staff quarters, lamps, cooking, linens, draperies and cleaning equipment.

At present, no new personnel are being hired.

There is no intention to fill the York Manor Home for the Aged with paying residents. Reeve Clarence Davis stressed at York County Council last week that the home is for the indigent and is there to provide a service for the senior citizens of the county who need care.

Last year it took \$95,000 to run the home. Salaries took \$11,000 while the annual food bill topped \$19,000.

School Sections Not in Trouble

Through a misunderstanding during Whitchurch Twp. discussions recently, reference was made to the school sections of Bloomington and Ringwood which inferred financial troubles, which was erroneous.

Last week, The Tribune carried an item clearing the Bloomington section of any financial difficulty and the Ringwood Board would like the public, particularly those in that school section, to know the facts concerning that school. These are as follows:

1. The addition of one room to Ringwood School, from specifications drawn up in 1955, was completed and formally opened in September of 1956. For this building, no additional land was required or purchased.
2. Debentures for the financing of this extension were sold at par on December 15th, 1957, and the School Board received the accrued interest. The first levy for these debentures was in 1958.
3. For playground purposes, Ringwood School Board purchased and paid for two acres of additional land this past summer (1960).

Local Man Given 8 Years For Assault

A 22-year-old Musselman's Lake man was sentenced to eight years by Mr. Justice Thompson last week for what he described as "one of the most abhorrent, shocking and despicable of crimes."

An assize jury required less than half an hour's deliberation to find Victor Arthur "Pete" Young guilty of rape.

Young was charged after his 15-year-old cousin complained she had been criminally assaulted while baby-sitting for relatives.

Mr. Justice Thompson reminded Young that "this most serious, heinous crime carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment, together with a whipping."

Relief Picture Is Unchanged

Relief in Whitchurch Township in 1960 amounted to \$34,080 which is subject to an 80% grant from the government. Council, in discussing the problem, expressed the view that little improvement could be looked for this year. The January account for relief was \$3,425.25.

Will Rent Steamer
Council decided against the purchase of a machine for thawing of frozen culverts. A small machine costing \$150 was not what the road department required, and larger machines cost as much as \$5,000 with second-hand price being \$2,500. In past years the township has rented this equipment and agreed to follow this policy again this year. The average amount spent on this work in a year is \$500.

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
