Brown's Corners Church Annual Meeting — With the official opening of the new extension only a few days off, (Feb. 12), there was an optimistic note at Brown's Corners United Church annual meeting held in the Christian Education room on Monday evening.

Church membership stands at 190, (active and non-active) at present, and receipts for current expenses during 1960 were \$7,750.41, with payment of \$636.25 to Toronto Home Missions Extension and \$1,812.20 to M. & M. Building Fund expenditure amounted to \$36,300.29, on which there was a bank balance of \$307.08 at the end of 1960. The final bill from Speckert Construction has not yet been received but contract price was \$46,989.00. Portions of the finishing processes are not included in this price, and will be taken care of by various organizations in the church.

Paving Townline West To Yonge St. To Be Completed This Summer

York County will complete the paving of the Whitchurch-Markham townline from Gormley to Yonge St. this summer. This work is part of the county road program, approved on Tuesday of this week by County Council.

The cost of paving this 2.75 miles will be \$160,000. Of this amount the province pays 50%, Metro 25% and York County 25%.

In addition to this major paving job, additional grading and paving is to be done from Stouffville along the townline east. An amount of \$3400 is to be spent in completing this stretch.

Considerable work is to be done this year on the Aurora sideroad, from the Vandorf stop light west. The intersection adjacent to the Wesley Church is to be widened in order to remove a danger spot where several fatal accidents have occurred. The county has set aside \$160,000 for what the committee report terms intersection channelization.

Mr. Jack Rettle in speaking to county council commented on the fact that the freedom from snow this winter would give the municipalities a better purse to take care of their road work this coming summer.

Whitchurch To Help Retarded Children's School

Whitchurch Twp. council approved a grant of \$540 this week for the Newmarket school for Retarded Children. Mr. G. Ridler, a member of the Newmarket Lions Club, sponsors of the school, appeared before council.

His visit followed several letters written to council requesting help in liquidating the remaining indebtedness on the school. Mr. Ridler stated that originally the school was to only have two rooms for \$12,000, but the building had been enlarged to four rooms at a cost of \$27,000. He drew attention to the fact that the school maintained itself in so far as payment of staff.

Tanker Too Old

Harold Botham and Bruce Clark appeared before council on Monday representing the Federation of Agriculture. They advised that the water tank truck serving Whitchurch and King for fires, was no longer serviceable. They said it was difficult to get a man to drive it, as it was very hard to steer especially when loaded with 1200 gallons of water.

Council suggested that the deputation contact sources having such units for sale, and report back, also an expression of opinion from King Twp.
