

He made no mistake. Spectators and players on both clubs were momentarily stunned by the suddenness of the game's conclusion. The Procenko-Gayman combination was mobbed by their Markham mates.

There were fourteen penalties in the game, eight of these to Ringwood. With the exception of a fistic encounter between Ringwood's Don Jackson and Markham's Ron Graham, the infractions were all of a minor nature. Jackson and Graham each received majors.
