

# Procenko Ends Play-off Game With Overtime Goal as Markham Wins

"Somebody had to score it," commented Morris Procenko, playing coach of the Markham "Aces" after he fired the game-winning goal in the sudden-death overtime period of the Community League playoff opener on Friday night. The climactic tally after only 57 seconds of the extra inning gave Markham a thrilling 5-4 victory over Ringwood. The two teams will square off again on Friday evening of this week at eight o'clock.

Ringwood, the underdog entry in the title series, turned in a torrid performance. They blasted a total of 44 shots at netminder Bob Riddell in the Markham cage. Only four slipped past him. The stocky puckstopper entered the game "cold" after a lengthy layoff during the latter part of the regular season. He appeared right at home again between the pipes.

Don Haynes turned in a powerful performance on the Ringwood rearguard. He was skating harder, lugging the puck farther and shooting faster than in many previous contests. He fired Ringwood's fourth tally, after completing a rink-long dash past the prostrate forms of six Markham defenders. The goal, early in the final frame, pushed both clubs into sudden-death overtime. As Haynes was a stalwart star on the Ringwood roster, so Markham's Lawrence Gayman looked brilliant on the "Aces" front line. He netted a three-goal hat trick and set Morris Procenko up for the winner. Every time the Markham puck-juggler embarked on a goal-bound rush, he carried a would-be tally on his stick. Dave Jennings counted the other Markham marker, Bruce Fockler, with a pair, and Jake Harman blinked the light for Ringwood.

Both teams had some wide-open opportunities to sew up the win, long before the overtime period. Markham's Al Tidbury was checked, late in the final frame as he prepared to deposit the disk in the open corner. Ringwood's Don Jackson fanned on a rebound shot with only seconds to go. Both Jackson and Ross Madill caromed shots off the Markham goal post. Two Markham tallies came with Ringwood players in the penalty box. Although Ringwood boasted a wide edge in the shots-on-goal department, many drives were long shots that were handled with comparative ease by netminder, Riddell. Markham, on the other hand, elected to work in close and pick the corners from difficult angles. Joe Carpenter blocked 20 drives. His best effort was on a clean-cut breakaway by Gayman. He held his ground and the forward was forced to take a point-blank shot into his pads.

Hardly had the fans settled back for a long-term overtime session, when coach Procenko hit the target. Markham appeared to carry the play from the drop of the puck and pelted goalie Carpenter with three shots in less than a minute. This set the stage for Procenko to tee off for the big one. He made no mistake. Spectators and players on both clubs were momentarily stunned by the suddenness of the game's conclusion. The Procenko-Gayman combination was mobbed by their Markham mates.

There were fourteen penalties in the game, eight of these to Ringwood. With the exception of a fistic encounter between Ringwood's Don Jackson and Markham's Ron Graham, the infractions were all of a minor nature. Jackson and Graham each received majors.
