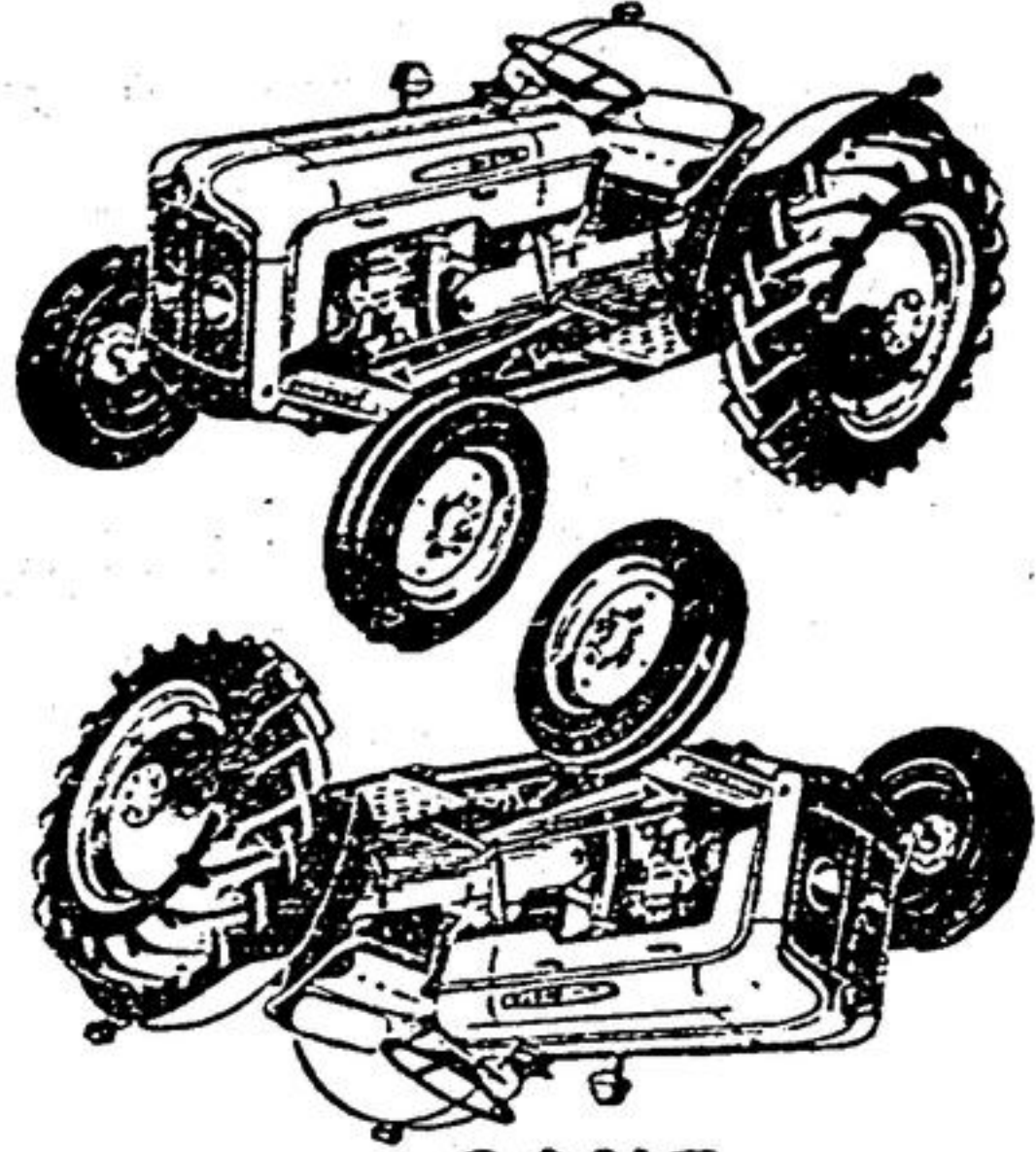


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Work of Agr. Federation in Pickering Twp.

for their hogs, and certainly more stability in the market.

In 1956 the Farmstead Improvement Project, in connection with the International Plowing Match on the Heber Down Farms, was successfully carried out. This project was not initiated by the Federation but was carried out by them, and meant a good deal of work securing entries, and taking the Judge about.

Help was given by members in canvassing for funds for the Co-op Milk Surplus Plant on 2 different occasions. Some help was given in canvassing for the Vegetable Growers Association, while more recently the Federation has had some success in helping in an expropriation case.

In addition to the above, the Executive and some appointed members have fairly regularly attended the meetings of the Ont. County Federation, which meets monthly except in summer time. In all the above projects which involved many hundreds of miles of driving and many days time, no member received any pay from the Pickering Township Federation.

The Ontario County Federation has greatly improved in its work and effectiveness in recent years, in the writer's opinion, and judging by attendance at the Annual meetings, has improved at the Township level somewhat, but there is room for much more improvement.

The Federation of Agriculture has worked, and is working in the fields of Marketing, of disease control, of land assessment, of land expropriation, of transportation, and of education. In the last named field it helps sponsor Farm Forums and puts the Rural Co-operator into every farmer's home. The Federation has increased the prestige of agriculture in the eyes of urban people, of business and professional people and of members of Parliament. When any question concerning agriculture arises, the opinion of the Federation is at once sought. It has been stated that the purpose of the Federation is to achieve a unity of purpose among the farmers of Canada. Only by a unity of purpose can farmers enjoy a level of prosperity enjoyed by other groups in our economy.
