"Jets" Ousted By Weston in O.H.A. Junior Semi-Finals

An expected thrilling series between Unionville and Saint Michaels for the Metro Jr. "B" championship failed to materialize as the "Jets" passed out of the playoff picture on Friday night in the fourth game of the semi-final round. Weston Dukes spotted Unionville one goal, then rallied with four-in-a-row in the second period to win 4-2. Weston is now entered in the group finals with St. Mikes.

Jerry Rowarth put Unionville out front 1-0 in the first period. Weston returned with four goals in three minutes to hold a 4-1 lead at the end of the second frame. Barry Watson notched the "Jets" lone tally in the last period.

Goal By Harmon Evens The Series

"If you didn't see it, you wouldn't believe it," stated Ringwood rearguard, Don Haynes as he peeled off his sodden garments at the conclusion of the Community League playoff game on Friday night. The Ringwood dressing room was still buzzing with excitement fifteen minutes after forward Jake Harman rattled a right angle shot into the Markham net at 3:10 of the overtime period to give his club a tight 7-6 victory and square the round at one game apiece.

With less than three minutes left in regulation time, Ringwood trailed their Markham rivals by a score of 6-3. The odds were stacked up against them a mile high, but they refused to give in. At 17:43 Ronnie Guy scored on a close-in drive. Twenty-two seconds later, Bruce Fockler blinked the light on passes from Guy and Joe Lewis. At this crucial stage in the game, Coach Clare Fockler gambled and pulled netminder, Ross Madill from the Ringwood cage. At 18:25, Bruce Fockler flipped a loose puck into the twine and the score was tied.

Within the space of thirty-seven seconds, Ringwood had collected three tallies, an all-time league record. It pushed both teams into sudden-death overtime.

Fired Up

Inspired by an almost unbelievable come-back, Ringwood were not to be denied in the overtime frame. In the first minute, Bruce Fockler sifted in on the target but Jim Johnston held the fort. Pete Goodfellow was the next to test Johnston's skill on a clean-cut breakaway, but again his efforts were nullified. Ringwood continued to press. Goodfellow drove the disk into the corner to Jake Harman. The rightwinger wheeled and fired a shot at the net, that caught Johnston standing a few inches away from the goal post. The puck hit his pad and skidded over the line. Harman was mobbed by his jubilant mates. The tense crowd, largest of the current series, released its pent-up emotions with varied displays of both dismay and elation.

Pleasure Skate

"We had it won and gave it away," said Bob Atkinson, Markham team captain. "Some of the guys were playing like it was a pleasure skate." The "Aces" held a workout on Tuesday night in preparation for the important third game on Friday.

Markham held a 4-3 lead at the end of the second period on goals by Lawrence Gayman, Al Tidsbury, Harry Young and Bob Graham. Harry Young and Al Tidsbury fired their second tallies of the contest midway through the final frame and all appeared lost for the Ringwood cause. With all the fury of a runaway pile-driver, Ringwood rallied to sink four-in-a-row, including Jake Harman's overtime winner. Bruce Fockler raised his playoff goal production to ten, with four. Pete Goodfellow and Ronnie Guy counted singles. Goodfellow, a returnee to the Ringwood ranks, was a standout. Both he and Harold Hodgson saw almost endless action. Ross Madill was forced back into the nets in the absence of Joe Carpentier. Mike McStravick and Don Jackson were absent from the Ringwood lineup. Ringwood outshot the "Aces" 29-19. Each team scored one goal while the other was shorthanded.

Nine Penalties

In the penalty department, Markham showed a sizeable edge. Their players spent fourteen minutes in the cooler while Ringwood served only four. Jennings, R. Graham, Tidsbury (2) and Keffer were banished for minor infractions on the Markham side of the penalty records. Joe Lewis and Guy caught the officials' eye for Ringwood. PSYCHIATRIC TREATMENT FOR 20-YEAR-OLD

John Edward Hodgson, aged 20 of Woodward Avenue, Markham Township, was charged with threatened assault and appeared in Newmarket Court this week before Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake. He was remanded for one week to allow time for a psychiatric examination. Catherine Hodgson, the youth's mother, said she feared that her son (whom she had adopted at the age of seven months) would injure her or her husband unless he were restrained. She told the court that her husband was a helpless invalid and could not defend himself in case of emergency. She also told the court that her son had, on occasion, twisted her arm in an effort to gain money from her. She also said that she had covered cheques which he had written on her account. She said she could no longer continue under the conditions.

When asked to explain his behaviour, the accused man implied that his mother had lied on the stand and on one point demanded that the Magistrate make her tell the truth. Magistrate Hollinrake said, in reply, "I am quite satisfied that the complainant had established her case and that this woman is in serious danger."

Hodgson heatedly denied the fact that he was in need of psychiatric help. Sgt. Robert Hood of Markham Township Police said that on his observation of the boy, he was of the opinion the youth was in need of some kind of help.
