Done All Possible For Unemployed Cathers Tells PC's

C. A. Cathers, local M. P., speaking at the annual meeting of the North York Conservative Association, told the audience that the federal government had been most liberal in its handling of the unemployed. He said that it was beyond government power to totally relieve the situation. It was regrettable, he said, that some had abused the liberal handouts of the unemployment insurance, but that these abuses were being remedied.

Mr. Cathers told the several hundred present that he thought it would be some time before Canada had a flag of its own.

"The various parts of Canada are very divided on this matter," he said. He said French Canada did not desire to have any Union Jack in the flag at all, while personally he would want to see the Union Jack there, as he believed many more would.

The C.N.R. annual deficit will only be eliminated by better times, he believed, and as regards the subsidy being paid to the CBC, he would like to hear the views of those in his riding.

In the annual election of officers, Don Findlay was returned as president for another year without opposition. In an election for the vice presidency, Mrs. Jean Moffatt won out over Jas. Murray, ex-Aurora mayor.

The annual meeting and election of officers for the North York Humane Society was attended by 30 members Tuesday evening, March 28, at the Canadian Legion Hall, Aurora.

Chairman was Mrs. F. M. Broomfield, president of the society.

Six young boys were presented with the Humane Society's Certificate, awarded to members who have performed outstanding service to animals in distress over the past year.

Three 13-year-old Lake Wilcox boys, Phillip Ross, Don Cobblestone and Bill Cook, were praised for finding two valuable samoyeds in the Lake Wilcox sand pits last summer.

Bill Donaldson, 14, King City, caught a vicious stray German shepherd dog running loose in Clearview Heights subdivision, King City, two weeks ago. The young boy was the only person who could handle the dog. He called the North York Humane Society who asked him to take the animal to a veterinary surgeon where it was painlessly destroyed.

Bob Storey, 14, Oak Ridges, fed and watered two abandoned dogs. In a court case which ensued, Bob was highly commended by the magistrate for his actions.

The sixth award winner, Bill Crawley, 14, Aurora, saved the life of a German shepherd dog which had been tangled in wire for three days. Bill called the Humane Society but in the meantime fed and watered the animal.

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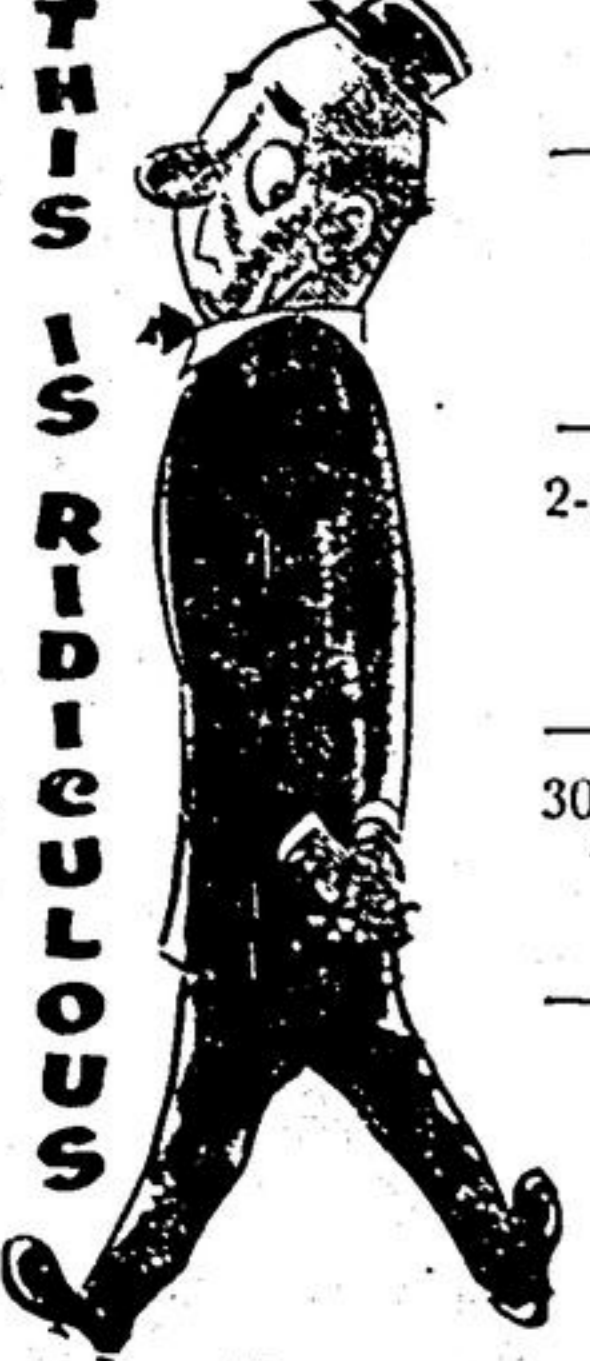
