The number of cancer cases reported during early stages of the disease is rising, according to the Canadian Cancer Society, which attributes the development to the second of the Society's three-fold programme of: research, education and welfare services. A nation-wide cam-

paign is currently underway with an objective of \$3,287,000. In Ontario, according to Dr. A. J. Phillips, statistician for the National Cancer Institute of Canada, during a recent ten-year period the number of lip cancers reported at their early stage in seven clinics increased from 75 to 80 percent. Early skin cancers seen in the clinics rose from 79% to 87%. Early cervical cancers went up from 27% to 39% and early breast cancers from 32% to 40%.
