Early Diagnosis Aids Cancer Cure

The number of cancer cases reported during early stages of the disease is rising, according to the Canadian Cancer Society, which attributes the development to the second of the Society's three-fold programme of: research, education and welfare services. A nation-wide campaign is currently underway with an objective of \$3,287,000. In Ontario, according to Dr. A. J. Phillips, statistician for the National Cancer Institute of Canada, during a recent ten-year period the number of lip cancers reported at their early stage in seven clinics increased from 75 to 80 percent. Early skin cancers seen in the clinics rose from 79% to 87%. Early cervical cancers went up from 27% to 39% and early breast cancers from 32% to 40%.
In Saskatchewan, he said, during a 15-year period, the proportions of early cases of lip, skin, cervix and breast cancers increased by 10 to 20 percent. Similar increases have been reported in other provinces.
Dr. Phillips quoted a report from the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., which has had a similar experience with early-reporting of cancer and which said: "It is significant that we can attribute a fair share of our progress, probably a major share, to education of the public to seek early treatment for cancer. For this we may be thankful to the lay organizations that have actively participated in the educational campaign to this end."

DEATH COOMBE

John James Coombe died at Goodwood on Saturday, April 22, 1961, in his 95th year. He was the husband of Edna Wagg and father of Elsie (Mrs. Boland). Funeral service was held on Monday, April 24th at 4 p.m. in Goodwood United Church. Interment was in Goodwood Cemetery.

When treated in its earliest form -- called Stage One by the doctor -- the proportion of patients who are well at the end of five years is about 75 to 80 percent. But if breast cancer is treated when in its late form, called Stage Four, the chance of a five-year survival is only about five percent. The story for other kinds of cancers is similar.
