Dear Sir:
Almost every issue of The Tribune during the past month has contained an item concerning a break-down of the Pickering Township tax rate. I may be mistaken, but by reading between the lines, I would gather that the Council is attempting to impress on the ratepayers the fact that they, as a governing body are steadily losing their control over the major portion of the collected tax dollar.
Figures do not lie and I am sure that we as ratepayers must fully realize the uncomfortable position that a Council now finds itself in. They have become merely a "rubber stamp" or a collecting agency. I would suggest, however, that come Nomination Night, there will be those who will attempt to throw the tax rate tale up in the members' faces and they will be the usual sitting ducks for a situation that, for the most part, is not their fault.
I feel that it is high time for the Council to assert itself and attempt to cut those costs at the County and High School level. In one year, according to The Tribune's latest figures, these two combined bodies have accounted for a rate increase of more than seven mills. To my way of thinking, such costs must be levelled off or Mr. Pic-

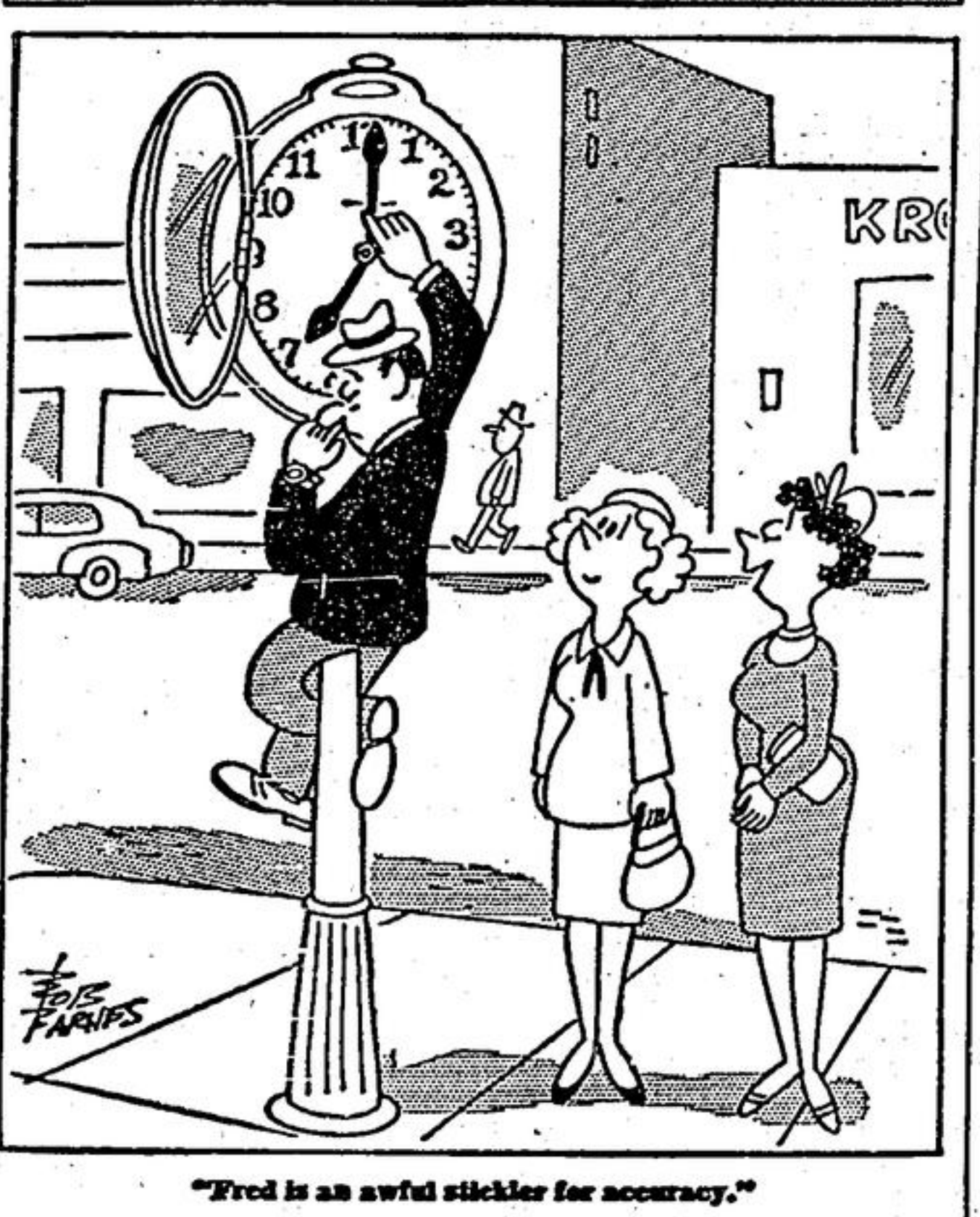
