 Monday of this week was a  
 dark day in Stouffville High's  
 track and field history. At the  
 annual Eckhardt Meet held at  
 Pickering College, Stouffville  
 placed last out of a field of  
 eight schools. Richmond Hill  
 counted a grand total of 222  
 points to win the event while  
 Thornhill was second with 140.  
 Woodbridge ranked third with  
 81 and Markham a close fourth  
 with 80. Newmarket took the  
 fifth place spot with 71 points,  
 Aurora seventh with 37 and  
 Stouffville held down last place  
 with a strong 34 points.

Glenn Jackson and Laurie  
 Buckland were Stouffville's on-  
 ly first place winners. Jackson  
 won the Intermediate broad  
 jump with a jump of 19 ft. 7  
 inches, and Buckland took the  
 real ribbon in the Junior pole-  
 vault event with a jump of 8  
 feet 4 inches.

John Riddle placed second in  
 the Junior broad jump and An-  
 drew Watson came third in the  
 Junior 100 yard dash. Barry Mc-  
 Lean and Joe Haylow took sec-  
 ond in their respective hurdle  
 heats and Bob Purdy finished  
 fourth in the Junior 880. Roger  
 Stover was fourth in the Senior  
 hop-step and jump event.  
 The Junior relay team (Rid-  
 dle, Watson, Middlemiss and  
 Meabry) finished second and  
 the Intermediate Boys relay  
 team ranked fourth.

In the girls entries Diane Nel-

son came third in the senior  
 high jump and Anna May Sand-  
 ers fourth in the Junior event.  
 The intermediate girls relay  
 team (Byer, Slack, Kidd and  
 Nicholson) finished second.

## 17-Yr.-Old Pays Fine from Own Bank Account

The heavy penalty that can be  
 imposed on a driver for break-  
 ing the speed limits was im-  
 pressed on a 17 year old Mark-  
 ham Village lad when he ap-  
 peared in Buttonville Traffic  
 Court on Friday morning with  
 his father to face a charge filed  
 by PC Darrel Dewar and PC  
 Wm. Gunn. Robt. G. Ward, Rob-  
 nson Street, was fined \$25.00  
 and \$8.50 costs for travelling  
 at 80 miles per hour in a 50 mile  
 zone on No. 7 Highway between  
 Markham and Unionville. Fol-  
 lowing the conviction, the ma-  
 gistrate in defence of his son,  
 informed the Court that his  
 boy would be required to pay  
 the entire fine out of his week-  
 ly allowance. His driver's per-  
 mit was also endorsed. The case,  
 one of the longest in Buttonville  
 Court history, was completed  
 after almost three hours of tes-  
 timony. The young driver had  
 entered a plea of not guilty and  
 was represented by counsel.

**Complete Surprise**  
 Mr. Ward said that the 80  
 mile per hour charge came as  
 a complete surprise and shock  
 to him. He said that his son  
 had told him that he had pos-  
 sibly been exceeding the speed  
 limit but not to the extent of  
 the charge. Miss Frances Jones  
 of Unionville, a front seat pas-  
 senger in the car, agreed under  
 oath, that the speed had been  
 excessive but felt that it would  
 be less than 80 miles per hour.  
 "I think my father has a  
 swell car, but I wasn't trying  
 to show off," said the defend-  
 ant. He said he was taking five  
 other young people home at  
 the time.

"The police have no axe to  
 grind with this young man in  
 any way, shape or form," said  
 Police Chief Fred White, speak-  
 ing for the Crown. He said that  
 both the accused and his family  
 were highly respected residents  
 of the community. He said that  
 the father had already placed  
 some restrictions on his son's  
 driving privileges and asked the  
 magistrate to show some leni-  
 ency since it was the youth's  
 first offense.

**Risk Officer's Lives**  
 Magistrate N. P. Kelley point-  
 ed out that there was no ques-  
 tion with regard to a speeding  
 infraction and suggested that  
 the charge could well have been  
 changed to that of careless driv-  
 ing. "There are too many inci-  
 dents of young people getting  
 into high-powered cars and risk-  
 ing the lives of police officers,"  
 he said. He noted that no officer  
 would accelerate his cruiser to  
 105 miles per hour unless such  
 action was necessary. He said  
 that other persons on the high-  
 way must also be protected. He  
 commended the father for his  
 presence in court. He said that  
 the offense could call for a max-  
 imum fine but on the request  
 of the Crown, he would show  
 leniency.
