Ratepayer Charges Inefficiencies in Twp. Police Department

A written complaint submitted through Councillor Clifford Laycox to Pickering Township Council concerning "inefficiencies" in the Pickering Police Department will be passed on to the Police Commission for further study. This action was taken on Monday night after a West Rouge ratepayer, Andy Dande criticized the operation of the Force when they were summoned to his golf course premises on several occasions.

The most recent incident, according to Mr. Dande's letter, involved a lady stricken with a heart attack. He claimed that four officers in two cruisers arrived on the scene without a doctor, ambulance or oxygen "and stood around while she died". He charged that with immediate medical attention her life might possibly have been spared. He charged further, that in sending two cars and four men, the remaining portion of the municipality was left unprotected. In addition, he said that an investigation had been carried out on his property without a search warrant and in another instance, he had been improperly charged and the officer in question had perjured himself on the stand in court.

"He claims he cannot get any co-operation from the police and as one of the township's largest taxpayers, he should deserve some service," said councillor Laycox.

"Whether he's the largest or the smallest taxpayer in the municipality, is not important," said Reeve Sherman Scott, "the police should be interested in protecting everyone."

The Reeve said that he had asked Mr. Dande to address his remarks in writing to the Police Commission, but he had refused. "If he will not file his complaints to the Commission, I will not bring them up," he said.

"He's worn a path to my door," commented councillor Laycox. He noted that it was not uncommon for children to play ball on his golf greens and use the flag for home plate. Mr. Laycox said that according to Mr. Dande, the police had been called but they did not arrive.

Reeve Scott noted that in reference to the suggested perjury charge, Mr. Dande had been given the opportunity to lay charges against the officer but he declined to take this action.

Councillor Milton Mowbray suggested that two letters, submitted by Mr. Dande through councillor Laycox should be placed before a meeting of the Police Commission. This action was approved.

A Toronto man has asked Pickering Township Council's approval of a smelting plant at Lot 22, Conc. 3. Mr. Allerton, a real estate agent introduced Mr. Golden to Council at a meeting on Monday night. The operation would take place in an abandoned gravel pit and would handle mainly discarded C. F. 100 aircraft obtained through the Government. Mr. Golden admitted that there would be some smoke and odour. Two furnaces would be installed at a cost of \$15,000 each.

"One advantage it has over a wrecking yard is that the scrap pile would go down rather than up," commented Deputy-Reeve Edgar James.
