## "Athlete of the Year" Award Presented To Lloyd Graves

**Grade 11 Student Had Excellent Record**  
Lloyd Graves, a husky, six foot grade 11 student, is Stouffville District High School's Athlete of the Year. The dark-haired competitor was selected out of seven other entries. The official presentation was made by the donor, Mr. Neil Patrick at the first annual Athletic Banquet on Friday evening. The handsome, seventeen year old is indeed a worthy recipient of the award as his last year's record clearly indicates.

As a fleet-footed halfback on the football squad, he is best remembered for his outstanding 100 yard plunge through a maze of Markham tacklers for a near touchdown. His strong rebounding tactics bolstered the defence on the championship Junior basketball team. He is an avid gymnast and as a Track and Field man, his achievements in the 440, 880, relay and shotput have been outstanding. His team mates consider him a hard working, determined and uncompromising competitor regardless of the game. His high standard of sportsmanship, his keen interest and a genuine will to win have made him a "Stouffville High School great". In spite of his numerous athletic activities, Lloyd has been able to maintain his academic standing at a level in excess of the 80 per cent mark. The announcement of the winner's name by Mr. Patrick was greeted with a tumultuous applause. Lloyd's name will be inscribed on a beautiful gold trophy.

Lloyd, a quiet, unassuming type of athlete, has risen to the peak of High School stardom strictly on the merits of his own ability. He and Betty-Ann Slack will represent their school at the Ontario Athletic Leadership Training Camp at Orillia early in August.

The guest speaker for the occasion was the noted television sportscaster, Mr. Fred Sgambatti. He presented a challenging message to all young athletes assembled in the auditorium. Head table guests included — Mr. Duxbury, Mrs. Gresham, Mr. Sgambatti, Mrs. Lee, Mr. Rehill, Mrs. Button, Diane Nelson and Don Eddington. Mrs. Button's remark that a new athletic track was on the High School Board's agenda brought an enthusiastic response from the students.

The presentation was made by Mr. Wilkes. A surprise presentation of individual engraved trophies to the Junior Boys' basketball team was made by Mr. C. E. Hendricks. A huge wine and white banner was also donated to the school by Mr. Hendricks. Mr. Neil Patrick presented his award to Lloyd Graves as the outstanding athlete of the year.
