## RE LIQUOR LICENCE ACT VOTE

- ✓ Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a dining lounge licence for consumption with meals on licenced premises?
- ✓ Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under lounge licence for consumption on licenced premises?

Wednesday, the 21st day of June, 1961
