## First Inspection for No.94 Squadron, Air Cadets

### "Aces" Win Fifth Straight

Markham "Aces" chalked up their fifth straight victory in defence of the South Ontario County softball title on Tuesday night by beating Port Perry 6-1.

Markham bunched all their runs into one inning, sparked by a home run blast from the bat of Lawrence Gayman. An error, two walks and a pair of doubles by Harry Young and Bernie McGriskin gave the Aces a commanding 6-0 lead in the second. Fitch hitter Jack Chapman spoiled Bob Ellis' bid for a shutout by belting a solid circuit clout over the head of left-fielder, Morris Procenko in the ninth inning with two out. Ellis registered 21 strikeouts.

Archie Menzies went the distance on the mound for the junior visitors. He was clipped for 7 hits. He walked four and struck out three. Six of the seven Markham safes were extra base bluffs. Ellis slammed a triple. McGriskin, Young, Mike Huggins and Monte Holman whacked out 4 doubles. "Nebbie" Gayman poled a four-bagger and Al Tidbury collected a single.

Markham have two new players on their roster in Bernie McGriskin, a long, lean lefthander at first base and George Clarke, a speedy outfield rover. Gayman has become a regular with the "Aces" and covers the third base hot spot. He has already wielded a big bat in keeping the team's win streak alive.

### Keith McDowell On Altona Mound

Keith McDowell is filling the spikes of his softball-famous brothers. He has joined the mound staff of the Altona club, last year's Community League champions. Bruce, Murray and Gord McDowell have all performed with Altona. Bruce has retired from active ranks. Murray and Gord have moved over to Mt. Zion in the South Ontario County circuit.

Keith McDowell was given the starting assignment against Claremont on Monday night but a heavy downpour washed out the contest in the fourth inning. The score was deadlocked at 2-2. Lloyd Pascoe was on the mound for Claremont.

The loss of some potent performers to Greenwood, has forced Coach Dave Beverley to strengthen his lineup with some newcomers. Grant Morgan and Keith Smith have joined the roster. Veteran catcher, Jack Rennie has also been pressed into service.

### Bantams Beat Colgan 20-8

Stouffville's promising Bantam team chalked up a 20-8 victory on Thursday night against Colgan, in their initial start of the season. Jim Daniels and Mike Cadieux shared the hurling chores. Francis Haylow worked behind the plate.

Brian Colbourn, a lefthander for the visitors, held Stouffville batsmen in check until he tired midway through the contest. Leftfielder, Hughie Maher took over and finished the game.

Jim Hill started the Stouffville rally rolling in the third inning when he belted a triple into a deep outfield. Tom Norton opened the locals' big seven-run 4th inning with a solid double. Wayne Crowder connected for a single and mixed in with a few bases on balls and a pair of errors, Stouffville took a commanding lead. They sewed up the victory with six runs in the fifth.

Jim Daniels was coasting along on the Stouffville mound until the 4th when two bobbles and a couple of hits put him in trouble. Mike Cadieux took over and put out the fire with two successive strike-outs.

Coach Bob Hassard used a total of 17 players in the five-inning game. William D. Holt, 27, who was charged with assault, pleaded not guilty in Newmarket Court on Monday and the case against him was dismissed. The charge was laid by Markham Township Police after a complaint had been made by Al Kwansica who operates a service station next to that of the accused. He claimed Holt had hit him as he drove his car too close, injuring his left leg and kidney. Kwansica claimed that Holt could see him clearly as he painted arrows leading to his property and that Holt had told him when he complained, "Shut up or I'll back up and do it again."

Holt denied the accusations and said he did not hit Kwansica with his car. He admitted that there was friction between the two but said that it was all on the part of Kwansica. Holt said he had tried to be friendly and be a good neighbor but it did not work out that way.

Police Constable Clifford Cox of Markham Twp. Police said he had been called to the service station by Kwansica on the 19th of April and that time Kwansica had been hurt. His shoes showed tire marks which could have been caused by some vehicle running over his foot. The police took the shoes for test and they were used in court as an exhibit. After hearing the evidence from a workman, Jas. Jewell, employed by Holt, the Magistrate dismissed the case.
