Charge Husband With Arson

Richard Rychlicki, age 35 of Lake Wilcox, appeared in Newmarket Court this week charged with arson and after a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Hollinrake was committed for trial by judge and jury. Rychlicki allegedly set fire to his wife Thelma's home at Lake Wilcox two weeks ago. The couple had been separated for a long period of time and Rychlicki has previously served prison terms on charges of assaulting his wife. In testimony the court heard a cousin of Mrs. Rychlicki say that both she and the accused man's wife had been warned by a telephone call that Rychlicki was coming to the house. She said they barricaded the doors so that he could not enter and shortly after heard a pounding on the door. She said after words had been exchanged through the door, Mrs. Rychlicki opened the door to call

her watch dog, which was outside, in an effort to protect herself. She said while the door was open Rychlicki came in and threw his coat on a chair and walked out into the garage. He attempted to light a fire there but was unsuccessful. He came back into the house and moments later set the curtains ablaze. The two Rychlicki children who were in bed at the time sleeping managed to escape before the house became ablaze. Mrs. Rychlicki called the police and the Aurora Fire Department and when Vandorf OPP arrived the accused man was still standing watching the flames envelope the house. He was arrested and charged with arson. Approximately \$5,000.00 damage was done to the home. Magistrate Hollinrake in committing Rychlicki said that bail will be set at \$7,500.00. He will appear at the fall assizes at the Supreme Court in Toronto.

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
