

The date set for the official ribbon-cutting is Sept. 8th. The business people are not only celebrating the opening of the new road but an end to six years of upheaval caused by the installation of sewers, gas mains and new telephone lines.

During the time of the celebration which is planned to run from Sept. 7th to the 16th, a host of fun-packed events are being arranged, including contests, a street dance, and the giving away of prizes galore. The carnival spirit will reign beginning Sept. .7th and the merchants ask that you keep an eye on your newspaper and your ear to the radio.

On Sept. 14-15-16, the gates will be down as the merchants go all out with bargains which are expected to attract hundreds to town. Their slogan will be-"It's fun to shop in Stouffville."


