P.O. Announces A New Stamp

A special postage stamp illustrating the multiple use of Canada's renewable natural resources is to be issued on the 12th of October, according to an announcement by the Postmaster General, the Honourable Wm. Hamilton.

Mr. Hamilton said the new stamp is part of the Post Office Department's contribution to the "Resources for Tomorrow" programme, a long-range project designed to ensure the effective multiple use of Canada's natural resources. The program is to be inaugurated by a Federal-Provincial conference scheduled for Montreal in October. The federal government, plus all ten provincial governments, is participating in the conference and all eleven governments are vigorously supporting the programme.

The Postmaster General noted that the "Resources for Tomorrow" programme was first suggested by the Prime Minister as a means of co-ordinating efforts to improve the management of Canada's natural resources. A major objective of the Montreal meeting will be an improved understanding of the necessity of public support for the effective multiple use of renewable resources. The stamp, symbolizing the renewable resources of agriculture, forestry, water power, fisheries and wildlife, and linking them with the wheel of industry, is intended to make all who see it in Canada and abroad conscious of the need for the effective multiple use of our resources today if we are to enjoy them in undiminished form tomorrow.

The new stamp is in addition to special issues commemorating Northern Development, Indian poetess Pauline Johnson, the late Honourable Arthur Meighen, former Prime Minister of Canada, and the 10th anniversary of the Colombo Plan, already announced for production during the year.
