limely lips On The Farm

Keep your cattle away from junk piles where you've thrown old paint cans and car batteries, advises Dr. Howard Neely, extension veterinarian at OVC. Even a small amount of lead can be fatal to cattle. Some orchard and vegetable sprays contain lead, too. Another precaution: Don't use leaded paints around

the barn, or fences, or in pens. Sanitation is still the best way to control flies. In warm weather the fly egg can become an adult fly in 10 days or less, says Dr. W.E. Heming, Head of the OAC Entomology Dept. There can be up to 400 fly maggots in 1 pound of manure. He advises removing the manure from the barn every other day. Take it to the field once a week. If you must store manure before family of Green River have spreading it, have only one pile

and keep the sides as steep as Water hemlock poisoning is fatal to livestock in nearly all cases, says Dr. D. C. Blood, of the OVC Farm Service. The animal may live only 2 or 3 hours but if it lives beyond a day or two you can expect complete recovery. The symptons are frothing at the mouth and pain; the pupils of the eye dilate and the animal groans and grates its teeth. There may be rapid kicking and rigid extension of the legs. Bloating frequently occurs. There is no effective treatment. But you can prevent it by fencing off wet areas containing
