Mt. Zion are still the O.A.S.A. Intermediate "D" champions of Ontario. They had to accomplish the feat the hard way by winning two games on a foreign field. They took the "rubber match" in Electric on Saturday night by a score of 5-3. Mt. Zion won the opener 1-0 but lost the return tilt 2-1.

Third baseman, Vern Ferguson connected for two potent blows to spark the winners' plate attack. He scored Mt. Zion's first run in the 6th inning. Grant Jones, Stan McMullen, Murray Jones and Kaye Evans added the clinchers in the 7th.

Ron Jones was the series hero. In three games, he registered a total of 52 strike-outs. He added 19 of these to his record in Saturday's contest. He was clipped for only 5 hits. Joe Verchoore on the Electric mound tossed a nifty 4-hitter. His mates gave him rather shaky support and committed 7 errors. Electric left five men stranded on the sacks.

In addition to Vern Ferguson, only John Hill and Grant Carson were able to touch Verchoore's offerings. The travel-weary Mt. Zion club returned home during the early hours of Sunday morning. It is likely they will be feted at a club banquet later in the year.

Go-Kart Boom Not Just a Fad, Says Association President

World Meet in '62

Goodwood Kartways, conc. 2, Uxbridge Township, is the suggested site for the World Go-Kart Championships in 1962. Such a plan was outlined at the conclusion of the International Meet conducted on Saturday and Sunday. An estimated 2,000 people were in attendance for the tournament final. A U.S. driver from Rockford, Ill., captured the Good-Year Trophy, donated by the Good-Year Tire and Rubber Co. About ninety entries were filed.

"Our regulations are aimed at the ultimate degree of safety," said Mr. Landreth. He noted that his Association had not received a single serious accident report to date. "The tracks are all under strict supervision and are constructed according to specifications," he continued. One track in Northern Ontario was closed down by the Association when it did not meet with the proper regulations.

Use of Mufflers
Mr. Landreth, the owner himself of a large kart track near Winnipeg, pointed out that the use of mufflers tended to take away from the popularity of the sport and affect the performance of the machines. He noted that a type of muffler was being constructed that would lessen the noise to a degree. He suggested that if a noise problem existed in the community, his Association would recommend the use of mufflers.

Robt. Carlson of Winnipeg was one of the first long-distance drivers to arrive at the track. He took his brand-new twin-engine kart out for a pre-tournament trial run on Friday afternoon. He was able to complete the half-mile circuit in 47 seconds. His maximum speed was estimated at 65 miles per hour.

The track site was described as "excellent" by Mr. Cam Landreth of Winnipeg, Manitoba, President of the Canadian Karting Association. He described the facilities as among the top three in Canada. For owners, Wm. Bell of Goodwood and Gary Hodgkins of Leaskdale, the operation represents a \$50,000 investment.

First Int. Meet
The competition during the weekend marked the first International tournament to be operated in conjunction with the North American Karting Association and held in Canada. Others have been conducted in the United States and Nassau.

Stouffville Juniors won their first game at Bayview High on Thursday. The big gun for Stouffville was Barry McLean, who ran 205 yards for all three touchdowns besides kicking a single.

Stouffville got possession of the ball early in the game and Jim Hill handed off to McLean who ran 43 yards for a touchdown. Stouffville missed the convert and Bayview took over. They marched down field to our three yard line where a determined attempt failed at the hands of the Stouffville defence. When the "wine and white" had their back to the wall, once again it was McLean to the rescue. Receiving the ball on the 3 yard line, with the help of some tremendous blocking, he dodged through the whole Bayview team and sprinted into the clear near the end of his 107 yard run.

Bayview, not to be outdone, intercepted the ball on the Stouffville 8 yard line, and Ed Dennis scored, making it 12-6. In the first half Gary Gall and Fred Watson plunged for extra yards while John Smithson, Peter O'Connor and Glen Avery were defensive heroes. Early in the third quarter McLean again amazed the fans by scoring his third major of the day, a school record, when he ran back a punt 55 yards. Again in possession Gary Gall went for 18 yards on a pass play deep into Bayview territory. This set the stage for McLean's final point as he booted the pig-skin into the end zone for a single. Late in the game Stouffville almost counted their fourth T.D. as Bill Corner caught Gall's

pass only to be hauled down 1 yard short of the goal line. Jim Miller ended any Bayview chances with a pass interception in the final minutes.
