Our Changing Times

The hemlines of women's skirts, as most everyone has heard, change their length with our changing times. There are some economic authorities who claim that this "cycle" of change affects our economy too as a natural law.

While leaving the answer to this complicated problem with the experts, it does seem that there is some evidence of this pattern in the car business.

The size of our cars has gone from small to medium to large and back again in 20 years; style, from chromeless simplicity to flashiness and back to simplicity; color, from black and white solids to two-tone multiple hues and back to the present solid black-and-white trends.

The way car dealers operate is changing too; before the last world war the automobile dealer dealt fully in all parts of the car business; then came the post-war shortage of cars when selling was easier (and more profitable) than service work, which tended to go increasingly to independent service garages; this changed gradually to the unrestricted price competition of the last few years with dealers selling the "deal" instead of the car.

Finally, with the slim car sales profits of 1961, the franchised dealer is once more earnestly engaged in building all his departments: tire and accessory sales, parts, gasoline and oil, with no service job too small. The public stands only to gain. With the manufacturer's knowledge and training facilities to aid him, plus his investment in equipment, the franchised dealer is most qualified to render all these services most economically.
