## 42,000 Phone Books Delivered This Week

The 1961 local edition of one of Canada's best read books, the telephone directory, is now on its way to telephone customers in Stouffville and Gormley, W. C. Barnes, Bell Telephone manager for this region, said this week.

The new directory should be used as soon as it is received, Mr. Barnes said.

Bell customers in Stouffville and Gormley will receive 2,700 copies of the directory this year, compared with 2,500 in 1960. Total circulation throughout the territory served by the telephone book will be 42,896, an increase of 1,300 over last year's total.

All Number Calling, under which telephone numbers each consist of seven numerals, is being introduced in Schomberg co-incident with the introduction there of dial telephone service November 5. The new method of listing numbers is in use in the new directory for Schomberg customers.

Mr. Barnes said that besides

the changes to the seven-digit form of listing numbers in Schomberg, there are hundreds of other changes included in the directory. A good way to avoid calling errors, he noted, is for the individual customer to amend his Blue Book of Telephone Numbers, or other personal list of telephone numbers. Extra copies of the Blue Book may be obtained free from any Bell business office.

In addition to Stouffville and Gormley, the new directory will serve Aurora, Bradford, Claremont, Keswick, King City, Maple, Markham, Mount Albert, Newmarket, Oak Ridges, Schomberg, Queensville, Richmond Hill, Sutton, Unionville, Uxbridge, and many other communities.

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Adding fluoride to the Stouffville water supply in the proportion of 1 part per million to reduce tooth decay is urged and supported by our Federal and Provincial Governments, by the constituted health authorities of Canada and the United States, and, bringing it closer to home, by our own Council and by every doctor and dentist practising in Stouffville.

### 1. DOES FLUORIDATION REDUCE TOOTH DECAY?

In every area where there is at least 1 part per million of fluoride in the water supply, tooth decay has been greatly reduced — in fact, up to 69 per cent less decay than the people of Stouffville are presently suffering.

### 2. IS FLUORIDATION COSTLY?

The yearly cost to each person in Stouffville would be about 23 cents per person, whereas at present the average family in Stouffville is spending over \$25.00 a year in dental care. Stouffville taxes will not go up one cent because of fluoridation, and fluoridation can be installed at the present time without increasing the water rates.

### 3. CAN FLUORIDATION CAUSE ILLNESS IN OLDER PEOPLE?

No. Absolutely not! The Federal Department of National Health and Welfare and many other recognized medical bodies have been conducting long and careful surveys for many years and their findings show that fluoridation can not harm anyone of any age. Do you think the Canadian Government or your own doctor would recommend fluoridation if it could possibly harm anyone?

### 4. WILL FLUORIDATION MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO THE TASTE, SMELL OR APPEARANCE OF STOUFFVILLE WATER?

Fluoridation makes no difference whatsoever to the taste, smell or appearance of water. Stouffville water does not have enough of this natural element at present, and for reasons of better health, fluoride should be replaced in the water.

### 5. HOW MANY PEOPLE NOW DRINK WATER CONTAINING THE RECOMMENDED AMOUNTS OF FLUORIDE?

One person in every three in the United States and more than one person in fifteen in Canada.
