## Major Rule Changes OK'd By OHA, OMHA

There have been several changes in hockey rules for the coming season. Chief among these is the change covering the icing rule.

"This season, with the exception of Junior 'A' and pro, icing the puck is completed the instant the puck crosses the goal line and the referee's whistle shall be blown immediately, stopping the play, unless the puck shall have entered the goal. In this case a goal shall be allowed.

The Ontario Minor Hockey Association plans to use this new rule in all its series, juvenile and lower.

A new Rule 85 has been added. It reads: (a) major penalty shall be imposed on any player who spears an opponent, and should injury result, a match penalty shall be imposed.

(b) For a second infraction of spearing by the same player in the same game, a game misconduct penalty shall be assessed and his team will play short-handed for five minutes.

The rule covering molesting officials has been revised. It now reads "any player, coach, manager or trainer, who intentionally touches, holds, pushes, trips or bodychecks a referee or minor official during, or after a game, shall receive a match penalty and shall be reported to the president by the referee. Such offenders shall be suspended for not less than three games.

Then there is a change in Rule 53: "A minor penalty shall be imposed on a goal-keeper who deliberately falls on or gathers the puck into his body when the puck is behind the 'goal-line' provided the goal-keeper's body is entirely outside the boundaries of his own crease area."

Fans will also note a change in the make-up of the end zone face-off spots and circles. These

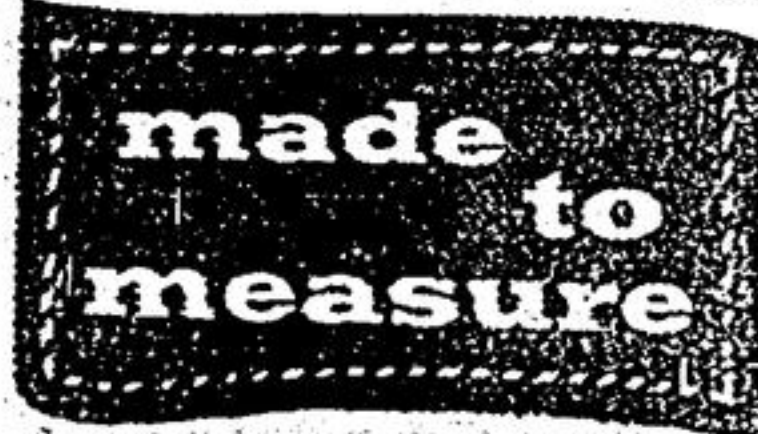

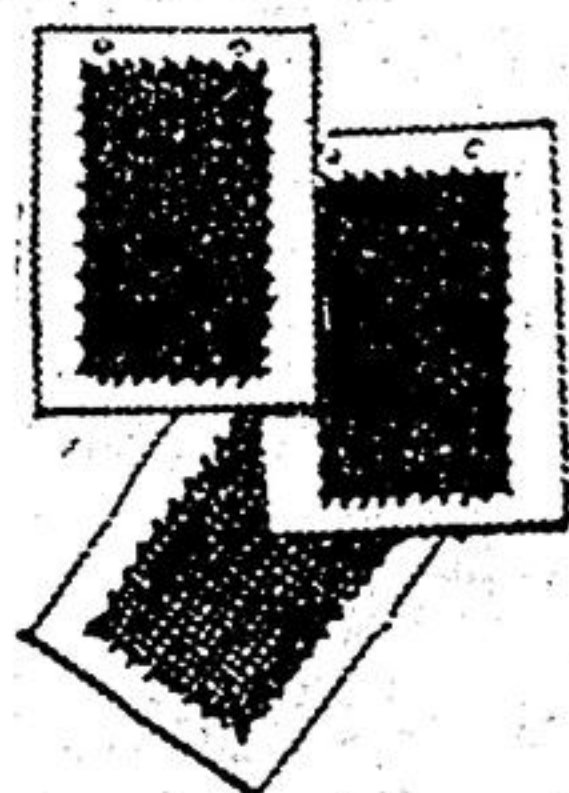
