Question of Electing H.S. Board Members Shelved For Present

The question of whether or not members of high school boards should continue to be appointed by council or should be elected by the people, was shelved last week by York County Council. The matter may be raised at the close of this year's session or may await a new chairman in 1962, and he may or may not wish to discuss the subject.

Grant Henderson who is chairman of the Educational Committee, said that he would like direction from the members on the subject. He expressed favor regarding a change to elected members.

Floyd Perkins of Richmond Hill said he had always been in favor of elected members. "I doubt if several of the York Central Board members would be returned if they had to face an election," he said.

Reeve Ken Wagg of Stouffville said such action might lead to a number of persons not standing for office. He said Stouffville was well satisfied with its members as they had done good work. He considered any person found unsatisfactory should be removed from office by council. He had no personal objection to having the members elected, but an elected Board would be responsible to the electors and not to council.

Trend to Big Farms Seen Serious Problem

The trend to large-scale farming in Canada is raising serious problems, the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce says in its current Commercial Letter.

The most important aspects are:
The trend to larger farms is resulting in higher yields and "Canadian farmers are now capable of producing surpluses in nearly all lines of our agriculture";

"The number of farms is decreasing much more rapidly than was anticipated by the Gordon report, though total acreage remains fairly constant.

"The increase in the tempo and extent of change is making (the small farmer's) adjustment to it that much more difficult," the letter says.

Yields Increasing
The Gordon commission foresaw a decline in the number of farms to about 540,000 by 1980. It is now estimated the number will be only about 475,000.

While the number of farms is decreasing, yields are increasing. And though the export picture, particularly in wheat, is a happy one this year, the Common Market, and the United Kingdom's possible entry into it, pose a serious threat to our export markets.

"The Common Market countries (Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, and the Netherlands) took some 16 per cent of our agricultural exports in 1960, while Britain took another 30 per cent — together valued at about \$438,000,000."

Canada now has tariff-free entry into the U.K. and a competitive position in the Common Market countries. But one of the goals of the Common Market is to establish a "distinctly restrictive and protectionist" economic policy, the letter says.

"This could be serious enough if it applied only to the six original members; if it is to apply also to the U.K., it would be that much more serious."

Production Off
Much of Canada's agricultural production was off this year in comparison with 1960 — largely because of the uneven weather conditions that included the worst drought on the prairies since the 1930's.

However, owing to a combination of a bad season and sales to new markets in China and Eastern Europe, it is likely that for the first time since 1951-52,

grain deliveries may be placed on open quotas well ahead of the current crop year's end in most, or all, the prairie delivery points.

At the same time, new markets could continue to be found if problems of payments can be solved since "there is a great unsatisfied demand for food in many parts of the world where purchases are now inhibited."

Mrs. Irven McLean is indisposed, with an attack of the flu.



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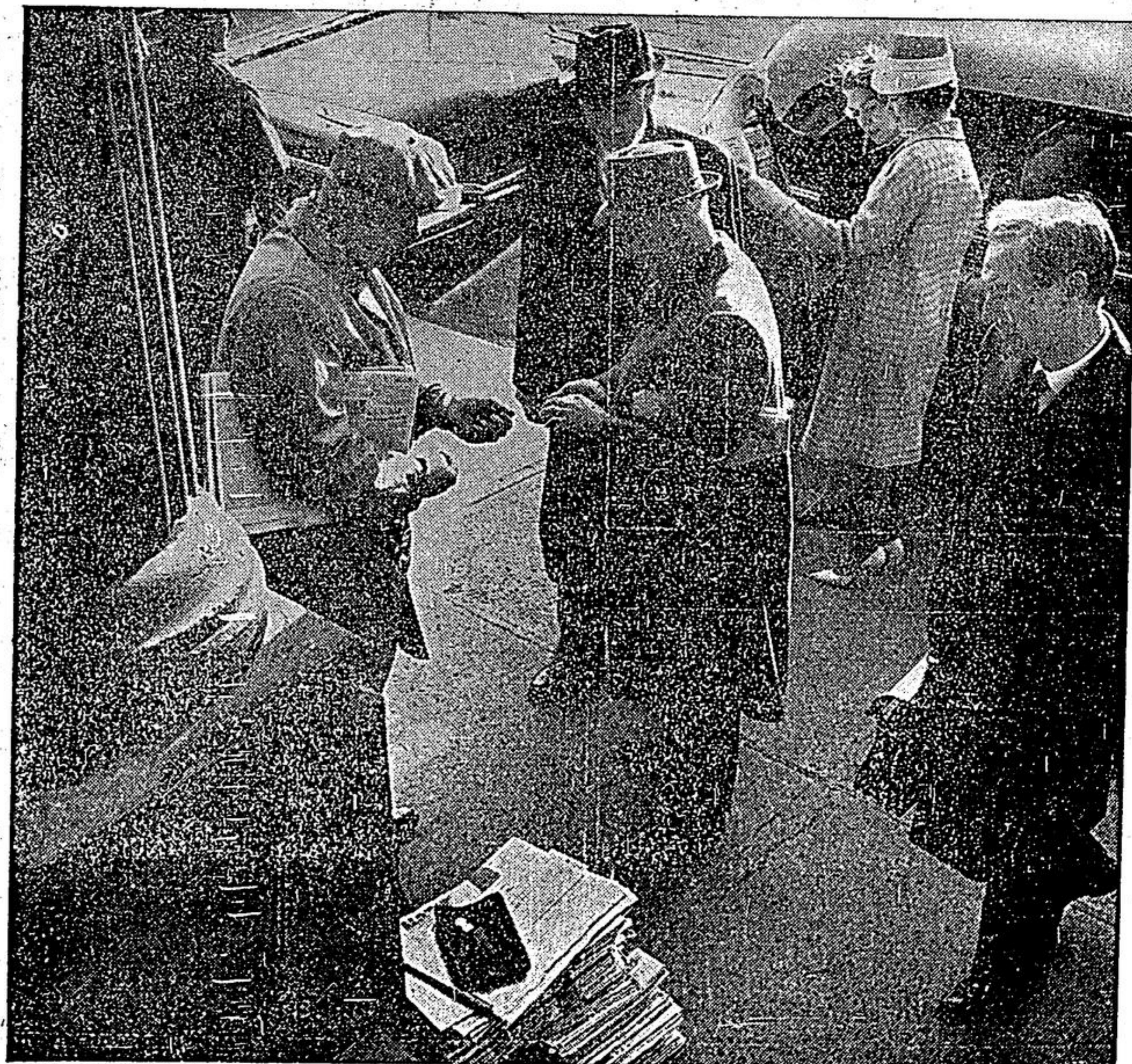
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
