Late Geo. Baker Former Resident Of Gormley

Following a lengthy illness at his home in Newmarket, Mr. George W. Baker, a native resident of the Gormley district, passed away on Saturday, Nov. 18th in the Brierbush Hospital, Stouffville. He was in his 86th year.

Born in 1876 on the Baker homestead, north of Victoria Square, he spent most of his youth in the area. While still a young man, his parents died and he, with his half-brother, George Honsberger journeyed to Sault Ste. Marie. They were the only undertakers in the town.

In 1901 he was married to Alberta Lehman of Almiria. They operated the general store and post office in the hamlet until 1905. Mr. Baker became interested in the building trade. He erected a shop in New Gormley where the Gormley Block Co. is now located. He later built his own home across the road and many other residences in Stouffville, Richmond Hill and the Gormley area. He was one of the first to receive shipments of coal and lumber when the first freight train arrived on the C.N.R. at Gormley in 1906.

Mr. Baker's friends knew him by the team of Indian ponies which he drove for many years. He was an ardent worker among the young people of Gormley and his good-natured sense of humor gained him a wide circle of friends. His hobbies were music and sports. Sixteen years ago he joined his sons in Newmarket where he continued to reside for the rest of his life. While at Gormley, he was identified with the United Missionary Church. He later attended the Church of the Nazarene in Newmarket.

Besides his wife, he leaves two sons, Lorne and Murray of Newmarket and two daughters, Mrs. W. J. Klees of Willowdale and Mrs. J. H. Houck of Unionville. There are thirteen grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

The funeral service was conducted from the parlors of Roadhouse and Rose, on Monday, Nov. 20th. Rev. Coghill and Rev. E. Sparks were in charge with interment in Heise Hill Cemetery. A favourite hymn of the deceased, "Shall we Gather at the River?" was rendered by Mr. Paul Mullen. The pallbearers were all grandchildren, Will and Carl Klees, Bruce Baker, Duane Mullen, John Houck and Lloyd Baker.

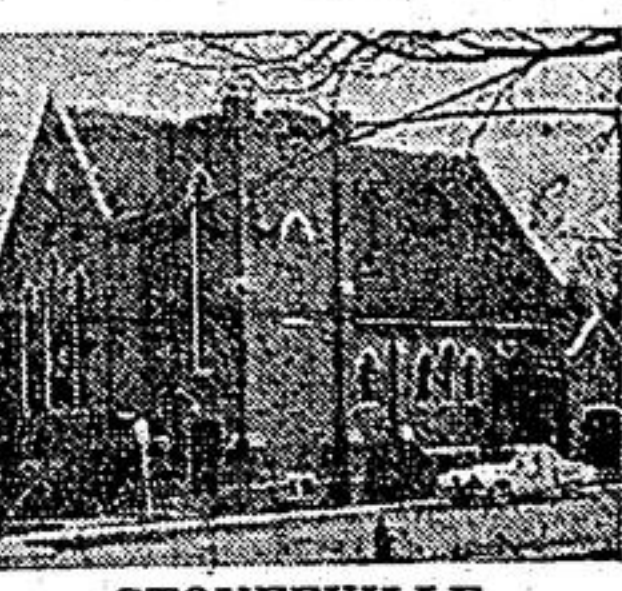
