# Boyd Sparks Stouffville Juniors in 7-2 Win Over Uxbridge In Home Debut

O.H.A. hockey returned to Stouffville on Tuesday night and the local Junior "D" squad, sparked by defenceman, Allan Boyd, posted a 7-2 victory over Uxbridge in an impressive home debut. It was Boyd's clean, aggressive play, plus an unerring shot that sparked the club to its first win in two starts. They dropped their schedule opener against Newmarket 6-5 in overtime, last week.

It was Allan Boyd who appeared to lift the team when hard-pressed in their own zone. He displayed good puck-carrying ability and sizzled two shots into the Uxbridge cage. One tally came on a clean-cut breakaway while shorthanded. Late in the third period he turned the disk on edge to beat netminder, Ken May from fifteen feet out. Jack Raymond, Gormley's "Flying Frenchman" was also a two-goal marksman for Stouffville. Rick Wedseloft, Wayne Pennanen and Ken Beckett fired singles. John Taylor and Mike Gray were the goal-getters for Uxbridge.

### Effective Effort

Raymond, although a lightweight forward, looked impressive every time out. He teamed up Ken Beckett for Stouffville's first tally and blinked the light on a solo effort in the final frame. He was on the receiving end of some stiff checks late in the game, which slowed him down. Last season, he played inter-collegiate juvenile as a member of DeLaSalle College in Quebec. He is only 17. Some of the Stouffville boys looked badly out of condition and their performances will undoubtedly improve as they round into mid-season form. Defensive stalwart, Roger Stover was not out, due to the pressure of Christmas examinations. Peter Stover is still on the disabled list.

### Jackson Steady

Glenn Jackson played his usual steady game in the Stouffville nets and blocked a total of 18 shots. He looked exceptionally brilliant on a bullet drive by Roger Forsyth in the first period. The rebound glanced off the post. He had little chance to block the shots that did evade him. Gray's goal came on a one-man breakaway. Taylor's marker was a three-way passing play with Gary Ashton and Ron Stewart collecting assists. The teams were playing five aside at the time with Ron James of Uxbridge and Keith McDowell of Stouffville both in the cooler. Ken May in the Uxbridge cage saw plenty of action. He stopped 22 shots. He looked good on two wide-open chances by Stouffville's Barry McLean and Keith McDowell.
