Trek to Pickering Polls On Saturday, Dec. 9th Is Last Until 1963

The election on Saturday, Dec. 9th, is an important one for the ratepayers of Pickering Township. The electorate will not have an opportunity to exercise their franchise again until 1963, since the new Council will hold office for a two-year term.

Although a total of thirteen candidates are competing for 4 separate posts, the main interest, as far as rural ratepayers are concerned will be focussed on the race for the deputy-reeveship. Mrs. Jean McPherson, councillors Clifford Laycox and Harry Boyes are engaged in a three-way fight for the position. Six candidates are competing in Ward 3; two in Ward 4 and two in Ward 5. Reeve Scott and councillors Harvey Spang and Milton Mowbray have been acclaimed.

Three questions and one bylaw will also appear as separate ballots, including: (1) Sunday sports, (2) Sunday movies, (3) Public library system, (4) Purchase of industrial land. The additional work in tabulating the results may delay the final returns to a later hour than usual on Saturday evening.

Paul Wellman Wins 100 Bushel Corn Club

Mr. Paul Wellman, R.R. 2, Claremont, was the winner of the Ontario County 100 Bushel Corn Club this year. He had a yield of 121.7 bushels of shelled 15% moisture corn per acre. In second place was Jack Leek, Sandford, with a yield of 114.4 bushels per acre. In third place was Gordon Hunter, of Brooklin, with a yield of 109.4 bushels per acre.

Nineteen farmers took part in the 100 Bushel Corn Club this year. Yields were taken on a 3-acre plot. Each contestant could use any variety he wished, and use any means at his disposal to procure the highest possible yield. The average yield for the nineteen contestants was 88.93 bushels per acre.

Irven L. McLean Active In Church, Lodge and Farm Organizations

Irven Laughlin McLean of Greenwood passed away suddenly on Saturday, November 25th, in his 65th year.

Mr. McLean was born at Boulter, in the County of Hastings, April 27th, 1897. He was the son of Robert McLean and Mary Jane Young, pioneers of North Hastings. He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, the former

Mary B. Bartlett, and his daughters, Beatrice of Greenwood and Elva (Mrs. Gerald Henning) also of Greenwood and three grandsons, Edward, Lloyd and David Kenning. The surviving brothers are Howard of Boulter, Clarence of Oshawa, and Daniel of Detroit. Brothers and sisters who predeceased him were: Robert, Agnes, James, Jennie, Annie, Bella, David, Emma, William and Grace.

Mr. McLean enlisted in The First World War and was taken prisoner at Vimy. In February of 1918 he was reported "died while prisoner-of-war". Therefore, a combined Memorial Service was held in his home church at that time for both him and his brother William who was killed overseas. However, Irven McLean lived to return home after the war was over.

In 1921 he married Mary Edna Bartlett of Montegale and worked in the local faldspar mines for a few years. In 1923 the family moved to Oshawa and he worked at General Motors for twenty-two years. In 1939 he bought a farm at Greenwood and lived there until his death. In 1950 he became a field underwriter for Co-operators Insurance Association.

Mr. McLean was very active in community activities and will be sadly missed in many organizations. He was a member of Corinthian Lodge No. 61 IOOF for thirty-eight years and was a Past District Deputy. He was also a member of The Ontario Encampment No. 11 IOOF, and the Oshawa Rebekah Lodge No. 3. He was a member of Greenwood United Church and served on the Board as a Trustee. He was very active in Ont. County Federation of Agriculture, the Greenwood Farm Forum, and was County Chairman of Farm Forum at the time of his death.

CANDLE CARE

Candles are popular at Christmas, but they can be dangerous. If a candle is too large for the opening in the candlestick, dip the base of the candle in very hot water and you can then press it gently into the holder. Begin Construction Hospital Addition Next Summer

Construction of the new 110-bed Ajax and Pickering General Hospital will begin next summer, the hospital board of directors decided at their monthly meeting.

"We don't want anyone in this area to think that there are any 'ifs, buts or maybes' about our intention to proceed," hospital president R. D. Thompson emphasized.

"Everyone is well aware of the fact that we cannot continue to provide effective hospital coverage for this area with present facilities, and the new hospital must be started just as soon as the funds are available — as quickly as final architect's plans are completed and we have received tenders from the contractors."

Mr. Thompson said the decision was made in view of the confidence the board had in the success of the \$495,000 hospital building fund.

"The advance gifts, to date, and the enthusiasm of the hundreds of volunteers who will be canvassing next week have encouraged the firm belief that our goal will be reached, and that we can give the go-ahead to the architect after negotiations with the County Council are completed," he said.

The hospital operates at 110 percent of capacity, with as many as 65 patients crammed into the wartime frame building designed for 45. The new hospital will have 110 beds for adults and children, 24 bassinets, four operating rooms and two delivery rooms, and can be economically expanded to 500 beds when needed.
