An Ontario Liquor Control Board ruling forbids the sale of liquor from 11:30 p.m. Saturday until noon New Year's Day. The province is not issuing any post-midnight banquet permits.

The Sabbath New Year's Eve has resulted in a number of Metro clubs cancelling their traditional celebrations. Here in Stouffville most of the celebrating has been done in private homes, which will not be affected. Those, however, who normally frequent city night spots and hotels will find their revelry this year cut short and may decide to join in the fun at the home fireside.

We note that only in Quebec, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland will licensed public places be permitted to serve liquor, beer and wine New Year's Eve.
