With Limited Budget E.M.O. Like Playing "Cops and Robbers"

Warden Anson Gerrow, of Ontario County, said that the recent EMO alert was "like playing cops and robbers" in this county. Mr. Gerrow, in his final address to the Ontario County Council said that with the limited budget permitted for Emergency Measures, this is about all that can happen.

At the close of the council, the last session of 1961 and the last day he would sit on the county council, Mr. Gerrow summed up the past year.

Regarding the recent EMO exercises and alert, the Warden said that it seemed peculiar to him that Canadians have to imagine what would happen in the event of an attack. The last test in this county, he said, "showed our incapacities."

He said that three county officials were on duty in the Ontario County building to work on the project and "had it been the real thing, we would have been demolished and annihilated."

How Inadequate —

"The exercise showed how inadequate we are," he said. "It seemed like we were playing cops and robbers but with the limited budget it is about all we can do."

The budget for the county and city of Oshawa EMO program for the year is about \$23,000, said one county official.

"It seems a shame to spend money for shelters," said Mr. Gerrow, "when the money could be spent for peace but that is the way of the land."

The Warden said that he did not have too much faith in fall-out shelters, especially in the towns and cities. He said that he attended a course in emergency measures in Annapolis this year and there they visualized what would happen if six bombs were dropped between Windsor and Montreal.

"If we were attacked," he said, "the people in shelters would be like rats in a hole."

"I believe we should strive for peace more than anything else," he said.

Prior to his address, Mr. Gerrow was presented with a wristwatch by Reeve John McCrorie, of Beaverton, on behalf of all members of the council.

It was a farewell for Mr. Gerrow, who will not be back to council next year.

E.M.O. Co-ordinator Estimates 50 Fall-out Shelters Now Built

The Co-ordinator of Ontario County Emergency Measures Organization has suggested that approximately fifty fall-out shelters have been built by private residents in the areas of Ajax, Whitby and Pickering. Col. F. S. Wotton revealed this information at a meeting of County Council last week when questioned by Reeve J. S. Scott of Pickering Township.

Col. Wotton contended that private citizens were even more aware of EMO activities than the various levels of government. He listed the various stages of his program that had been completed during the past nine months.

For Livestock —

"How does the livestock survive?" questioned Reeve Wm. Beard of Cannington.

"The Department of Agriculture has published a book titled 'Fallout on the Farm,'" replied Col. Wotton. "It is available to everyone and answers such questions as the survival of cattle, the treating of radiation exposed land and future seedling."

"Has the policy of evacuation been abandoned?" enquired Reeve Scott.

"No," replied Col. Wotton, "evacuation will occur for those in large cities who cannot possibly build fallout or blast-proof shelters and voluntary evacuation is being provided for them although this is not an EMO policy."

Lady Motorist Fined \$65.00

In Pickering Magistrate's Court last week, Violet May Carey of Pickering Township was convicted by Magistrate Robert Dnieper of charges of unlawfully opening a car door on a highway and parking on a highway.

The accused, who pleaded not guilty to both charges, was fined \$40 and costs or five days for the first charge and \$25 and costs or five days for the second charge.

Donald Wells of Scarborough who testified for the Crown, said that at 12:20 a.m. on Nov. 19 he was driving east on Highway No. 2 when he saw a car partially parked on the highway west of the Rosebank road intersection. He said that as he proceeded to overtake the car, its driver opened the car door and he struck it.

Const. Dave Fleming of the Pickering Township Police Department said that damage to the accused's car was \$150 and that she admitted she was the driver.

Smoke from Engine

The accused stated that on the night in question she was accompanied by her husband and her father and was driving home from a wedding reception. She said that as she passed the Rosebank road she noticed some smoke coming from the engine and into the car from beneath the dashboard.

She said she pulled the car onto the shoulder and proceeded to get her husband and father out of the car when the accident occurred.

His Worship learned that the shoulder of the highway was 8 feet wide and that the Carey car overlapped the highway by almost two feet.

Magistrate Dnieper said that the accused had no right to leave the car on the highway when it developed trouble.

He said he chose to disbelieve entirely the stories of the defence witnesses. He ruled that the fines for both charges would be consecutive.

Give Pay Hike At Ontario County Jail

Pay increases for the employees of the Ontario County Jail were approved in principle by Ontario County Council last week in the amount of \$300 a year for permanent employees and a \$2 a day increase for casual employees.

The increases which were recommended by the standing committee on County Property in its fourth report are subject to the acceptance of Branch No. 130 of the Civil Service Association of Ontario.

With the implementation of the above recommendation the salary schedule for employees of the jail would be:

Government—\$5,100 min., \$5,580 max.; Chief Turnkey and Maintenance Officer, both \$4,140 min., \$4,620 max.; Guards, \$3,540 min., \$4,020 max.; Matron, \$3,060 min., \$3,540 max.; Secretary, \$3,540 to \$4,020. All permanent employees would receive an annual increment of \$120.

The casual employees' salary increase would be increased to \$12 a day for men and \$10 a day for women.

Pickering Driver Pays \$100.00

A Pickering Township driver, who led police on a four-mile chase, was last week convicted of careless driving by Magistrate Robert Dnieper in Pickering Magistrate's Court.

Arley Edward Bauder of Altona road north, who pleaded guilty to the charge, was fined \$100 and costs or 15 days in jail and was also banned from driving for six months.

Const. Dave Fleming of the Pickering Township Police Department said that on Nov. 23 at 7:01 a.m. he was parked in a police cruiser at the intersection of Highway No. 2 and the Rosebank road when he saw an east-bound car travelling at a high speed on the highway.

He said he chased the car and at times their speed was up to 75 mph.

As he tracked the car on the highway, said the officer, the car tried to overtake two trucks and in so doing he almost met two cars head-on.

After covering four miles, said Const. Fleming, the car was stopped on Station road, and Bauder identified himself as the driver.

In speaking to sentence the accused explained that he was late for work at the time of the incident.

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County System Revision Urged

Revision of Ontario's county system to end "fragmented" government was among 12 suggestions submitted to the Ontario cabinet by the Ontario Municipal Association.

The resolutions drafted at the OMA's August meeting in Windsor also urged a new system of hospital financing. This asked that hospitals be allowed to do their own capital financing and apply payments on this to the per-diem rate they now charge the Ontario Hospital Services Commission.

The resolution aims to relieve municipalities of the cost of providing part of the capitalization, freeing the money for schools and sewage disposal plants, currently major problems in many communities.

In urging revision of county boundaries, the report suggested that their functions also be revised. It asked that separate counties be abolished to end "fragmented" government.

Municipalities be allowed to tax buildings on conservation land to which any admission is charged.

Standard dates be instituted for daylight time.

Compulsory elections be held for members of district high school boards.

The province assume the cost of educating mentally retarded children.

The Ontario Hospital Services Commission pay the cost of ambulance services on its insurance program.

Grant Ontario County Assessor Access To Municipal Records

Ontario County Council last week voted in favor of an Assessment Committee recommendation to give the County Assessor access to examine all local municipal assessment worksheets and records pertaining to the returning of a proper equalization.

The move was made by council to bring about a greater uniformity in the present method of county assessing. It was not made because some of the assessors in the county had refused to show their records to the County Assessor, G. D. Hepditch, although he did state that in the past he had some difficulty in gaining access to the worksheets of Whitby, Ajax and Pickering Township.

Mr. Hepditch stated that council had no control over the records of the assessors for the municipalities in Ontario County. Unless the law was changed, the assessment rolls were the property of the assessors, he pointed out in suggesting that council make proper legislation to give him legal access to the records.

The County Assessor said that he only wished to gain access to the records and not take them away. "This would only interfere with the functioning of their offices," he said.

"The only weapon a County Assessor has is to appeal assessments," he said, "and this is costly and creates bad feelings. The job is hard enough without

creating bad public relations," he added.

"I must have this background information to work with," he said. "We could have a better equalization in the county if I had full access to these records." Mr. Hepditch pointed out. He had not been refused in any municipality to see the assessment worksheets but claimed that unless the proper legislation was implemented, the assessors in the county could legally refuse.

Reeve Everett Quattrill of Whitby said that if the County Assessor had access to the records, they could get misplaced and their absence could be costly to the municipality concerned.

Reeve Sherman Scott requested that the term "access" be defined. "Does this mean that the county assessor can take the records away?" he asked.

With this problem of definition on hand, the committee adjourned for 15 minutes to define the word "access" and review the recommendation.

The committee's answer was that the County Assessor could gain access to the records which according to an assessment dictionary, meant "examine". The clause in the recommendation was amended to read "access to examine". Reeve Scott was convinced by the committee that the County Assessor could not take the records away, and the recommendation was finally adopted.
