Clippers Thump Newmarket 9-2

Bozborough Nets 4

Nine men, using a few hockey brains can still beat the pants off a 15-man club who resort to physical violence, and the Stouffville junior team can point to the score board for their proof. On Tuesday night, in the poorest played game of the season the homesters emerged with a 9-2 victory. Newmarket, the visitors, dressed a full squad of fifteen. Stouffville finished the skirmish with only nine.

Coach, Ross Goddard as equally concerned with his team's performance as many of the fans, tossed in the towel at the conclusion of the contest. The Newmarket promoter was one of the prime instigators of the local junior loop. It was the first "crude" encounter of the season to date. The Newmarket aggregation, spearheaded by a couple stick-wielding culprits, brandished their hockey like native war clubs and only latewarded off some serious injuries. The culmination of this violence came when Freddie Thomas of the "Redmen" swatted Stouffville's Barry Gaston a brutal blow in the face late in the final frame. He was tossed into the cooler for an all-too-brief 5 minutes. Gaston, although momentarily dazed by the impact, returned to the "fray" after a breather on the bench. Barry

McLean was more fortunate than his team-mate. An axe-like swing missed McLean's head by inches.

John Bozborough's performance continues to highlight the Stouffville club's play. In Tuesday's tilt, he rammed a total of four pucks into the Newmarket cage to raise his total to seven tallies in five games. In addition, he has collected four assists for 11 points. Although subjected to "a hard ride" by his opposition checks every time out, he seldom retaliates for any foolish penalties. Wayne Penanen, also enjoying a fine season to date, picked up a pair of goals. Singles came from the sticks of Wally McGee, Barry McLean and Barry Gaston. Ken Needer and Wilf O'Reilly were the Newmarket marksmen.

The Stouffville ranks were drastically thinned early in the contest when rearguard, Stan Feasby was cut for 9 stitches in an exchange back of the home-stater's net. Feasby, although no "Rocket" Richard, is one of the locals' steadiest defensive performers.

Next Tuesday night, Uxbridge will be the visitors on Stouffville ice in what promises to be a thrilling game. The contest will form part of a Minor Hockey Week program that opens on Monday and concludes on Thursday.

Merchants Tie Markham, Season's Best Game

A bullet backhand shot by Stouffville's Guy Weeks with both teams playing five aside, gave the "Merchants" a 4-4 split in the playing with Markham "Aces" on Friday night in a thrilling Community League contest. The largest crowd of the season watched the see-saw battle.

Stouffville played a wide open second half and scored thirty points. John Smithson counted an impressive 25 points as he racked up the largest single game score of his career. Jim Miller sank 9 points with Robert Mole and Jim Hill picking up 4 each. Bradford's only threat was John Milos who counted 8.

Fresh from this win the Juniors moved to the huge court at Bayview High where they trounced their opposition 44-31. Stouffville moved into an early 8-4 lead on the sharp shooting of Smithson. The fast race slowed down and Jim Hill, returning after a week long groin injury, started to find his mark. At the half Stouffville held a slim 18-15 lead.
