The High Cost of Poor Service

A good mechanic, like a good doctor, must primarily be an expert at diagnosis. Once he has pinpointed the exact cause of trouble, the remedy is usually routine.

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Won't Stand For Flouting Dog Bylaw

Councillor Elsie Gibbs of Whitchurch Township called on council Monday, to back up the Bylaw Control Officer to see that residents do not flout the township dog control bylaw. "If we don't back up our Control Officer, there's no use having one," said Mrs. Gibbs.

She said that one dog which she described as particularly vicious, was the property of a Lake Wilcox resident who had no intention of keeping the animal confined.

This dog has already attacked four people. The owner was fined but didn't pay the fine. Now he has been served with a committal warrant and hasn't paid any attention to that," she stated.

Mrs. Gibbs said that this was not the only instance. In another case, a troublesome animal was picked up, the owner took him back and released him again.

"They're just going to laugh at us," she said, "people say we won't do anything anyway." Reeve Wallwork said that council would look into the matter and Mrs. Gibbs presented the following resolution which passed unanimously: "That the dog control officer submit to council each month, a list of those to whom summonses have been issued for violation of the Dog Control Bylaw, along with penalties and results of same. If committal warrants are to be issued a report on dates issued and served be submitted each month by the officer."

Fox Believed Rabid Shot In Kitchen

Wayne McNeil, the husband of a former Stouffville girl, Marion Betz, shot and killed a fox in the kitchen of their Zephyr district home on Sunday morning, after it chased their dog Laddie, through the front door.
