Farm Taxation Meeting Draws Large Crowd

Manchester Hall was filled to near capacity when men from all parts of Ontario County accepted the invitation of the County Federation of Agriculture to attend a special meeting on assessment and taxation.

Grant Wallace, O.F.A. fieldman for this area in his introduction of the speaker Donald Middleton, of the Properties Department of O.F.A. — outlined briefly assessment as it is known today and stated that now the value of real estate does not reveal one's ability to pay.

Mr. Middleton in his opening statement said "Most farmers are poor-land poor, machinery poor or plain poor." There are several ways that taxes are collected. Taxes collected on Real Property are at present used chiefly for education and services to people. This system, it is felt, is unfair. Mr. Middleton offered several partial solutions to this existing problem. They were as follows—fixed assessment, fixed taxation, and taxation as a percentage of income, removal of the cost of education from land and or buildings, industrial tax might be collected provincially and distributed on a per capita basis, assess at market value with townships to decide the percentage for taxation, we might tax real property for service to land, relate taxation to planning, or introduce a capital Gains tax.

Mr. Middleton urged that people interested in the topic Taxation for Education, organize a special group to listen to and discuss the topic on Farm Radio Forum March 12th. Their findings could be sent into the provincial secretary of Farm Forum.

In the discussion period the farmers present urged that something be done to define a farmer.

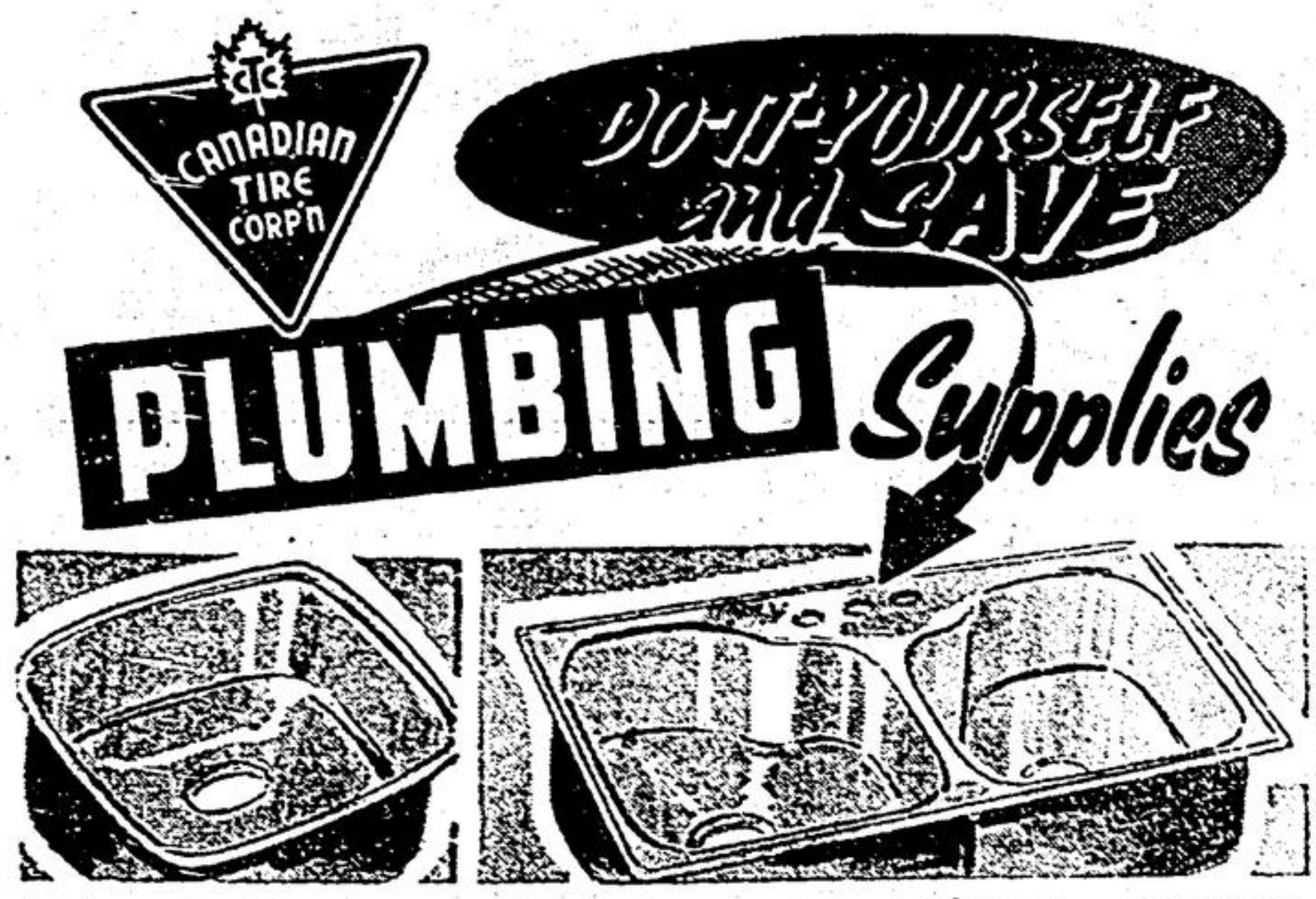

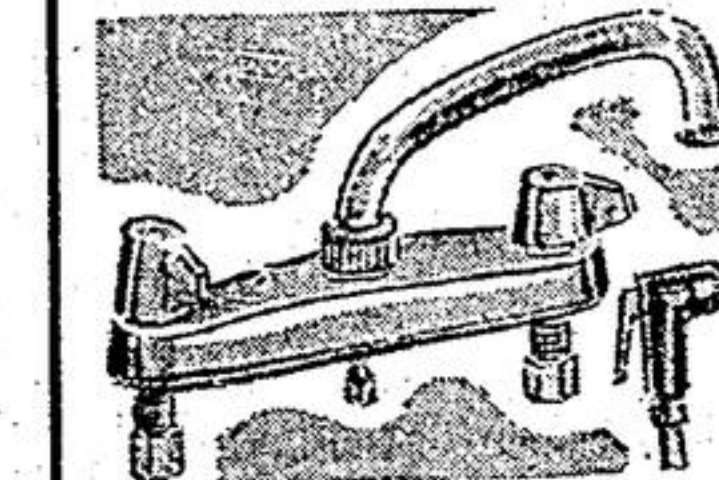

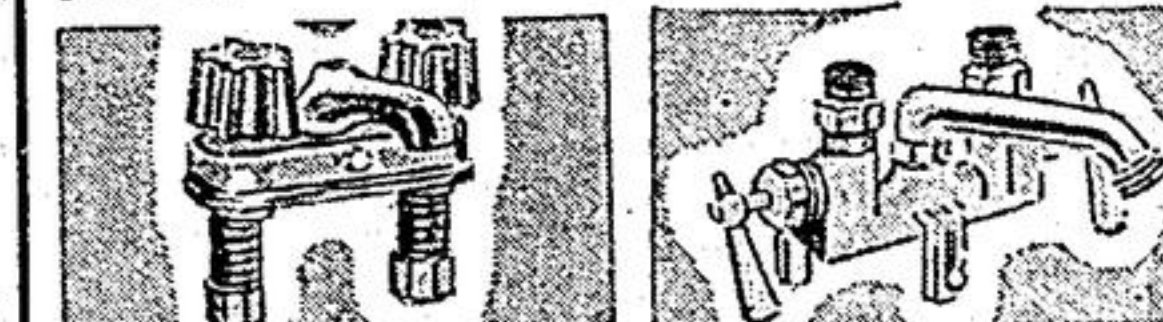
