

# Une of Town's Loming Down

The former Queen's Hotel located on Main Et. east and known as Queen's Court, is being demolished. The building was erected some seventy-five years ago by Mr. Dick Knill. This was the second hotel to be operated on this site, a hostelry being maintained there back in Riel Rebellion times and operated by a Mr. Anderson.

Mr. John Martin took charge of the Queens in 1889 and completely rebuilt the front of the building. When operated as a notel, the place was heated by two hot air furnaces and was one of the first public places in town to have electric lighting. There were large sample rooms for the travelling salesmen of that day and the place could accommodate 30 to 50 guests. Mr. Martin also operated an extensive livery stable business along side the hotel.

Other hotels operating in town at that time included the Mansion House, which is nearly one hundred years old, and has been renovated and is now operated as a commercial establishment near the C.N.R. The building opposite the Queens where is located the Antique House, was run as a hotel as well.
