Women From 59 Congregations Join York U.C. Women

Over six hundred women from the 59 congregations in York Presbytery attended the inaugural meeting of United Church Women at the Trinity United Church, Newmarket. The pre-existing organizations, the Women's Auxiliary, the "WA" and the Women's Missionary Society (the "WMS") were joined into one group of United Church Women with the aim of uniting all women of the church for the total mission of the church. During the month of January this inaugural service has taken place in 2800 churches in over 100 Presbyteries in Canada.

In the morning session the executive was elected and the allocation was set at \$20,700, for York Presbytery. Rev. Norman Pick, chairman of the provisional committee, presided. At the afternoon session the executive was dedicated during the service. Guest speaker was Rev. Geo. Morrison, associate secretary of the Board of Home Missions, a former resident of Aurora. He said that 350,000 United Church women was a mighty force and that women were only one branch of the total church effort in this day and age. "You must rise with the ring of vigor and truth to the challenge" that this new organization presents, said Rev. Morrison. Nominated to stand as candidate in the federal election was Stanley Hall, Newmarket, CCF candidate for North York during the 1959 federal elections. Mr. Hall is employed by Canada Packers Co. Ltd. of Toronto where he is plant administrator. He is married and has one infant boy. Mr. Hall was a member of the former CCF party for eight years before joining the N.D.P. upon its inception.

Two people were named as provincial nominees. Robert McVey of Markham Village and John Harman of Richmond Hill. Mr. McVey won the vote and therefore will stand as provincial candidate for the N.D.P. from North York in the next provincial election. He is a lawyer in Markham Village and is the father of four children.

One of Town's Early Hotels Coming Down

The former Queen's Hotel located on Main St. east and known as Queen's Court, is being demolished. The building was erected some seventy-five years ago by Mr. Dick Knill. This was the second hotel to be operated on this site, a hostelry being maintained there back in Riel Rebellion times and operated by a Mr. Anderson.

Mr. John Martin took charge of the Queens in 1889 and completely rebuilt the front of the building. When operated as a hotel, the place was heated by two hot air furnaces and was one of the first public places in town to have electric lighting. There were large sample rooms for the travelling salesmen of that day and the place could accommodate 30 to 50 guests. Mr. Martin also operated an extensive livery stable business along side the hotel.

Other hotels operating in town at that time included the Mansion House, which is nearly one hundred years old, and has been renovated and is now operated as a commercial establishment near the C.N.R. The building opposite the Queens where is located the Antique House, was run as a hotel as well.
