Three Minor Teams Engage Uxbridge In First Playoff Series

The town of Uxbridge could deal Stouffville's minor hockey playoff hopes a knock-out blow or vice versa as all three clubs are currently hooked up in the initial round. The Peewees, coached by Ernie Abraham; the Bantams, coached by Keith Sutherland and the Midgets, coached by Harold Hodgson are all battling it out in a lengthy series.

At the present time, both the Peewees and Midgets are off to flying starts. Ernie Abraham's squad blanked Uxbridge 8-0 on Tuesday night in their 3 out of 5 series opener. The Midgets hold a 2-0 lead, taking home and home games this week by close scores. This round is also a best 3 out of 5. The Bantams are all square with Uxbridge at two games apiece. Uxbridge evened the series on Monday night on Stouffville ice and the two clubs go at it again on Friday in Uxbridge. They will play a 4 out of 7. All three teams will see action here in Stouffville on Monday evening.

To add to the rivalry between the two towns, it is likely that Uxbridge Juniors will provide the opposition for the "Clippers" in their group playoff fixture, later this month.

Glenn Jackson Chalks Up First Shut-Out Of Local Schedule

"We won, but I don't know how," commented Geo. Stark, Coach of the Junior "Clippers" at the conclusion of a scheduled game with Newmarket on Tuesday night.

About the only bright feature of the lack-lustre contest was the shut-out performance of netminder, Glenn Jackson. He held the visitors off the score sheet for sixty minutes. His mates came up with two goals, one by John Roxborough and another by Barry Gaston. Stouffville won the game 2-0.

Roxborough roared down left wing-like he had been shot from a cannon, and sifted a low drive into the corner of the cage at 1:5 of the first frame. Gaston slapped Barry McLean's pass-cut into the twine at the nine minute mark of the second period. Both clubs went scoreless in the final twenty minutes.

Freddie Thomas was Newmarket's best, but like so many solo performers, his lone assault across the Stouffville blue-line usually petered out at the defence or in the corner. Goalie Jackson completed a dazzling stop off the winger in the first frame when he broke free with nobody back.

Allan Boyd of Stouffville and Ken Sturgeon of Newmarket added a little fuel to the near-zero confines of the arena when they hooked up in a minor wrestling bout. Both were banished with five minute majors.

Greenwood Clinches Playoff Berth

Greenwood clinched a berth in the Community Hockey League playoffs by beating their closest rivals, Ballantrae 7-1 on Friday night.

Bob Moffatt, left-winger on the Greenwood squad, raised his goal production to 15 for the season. He fired three tallies and assisted on two others. He has collected a total of 25 pts. Pete Byberg potted a pair for the winners. Bob Clodd and Jim Cherry counted singles. Eric Mortimer netted the lone Ballantrae goal on passes from Jim Meyer and Rae Pipher. If the standings remain unchanged, Greenwood will meet Markham in the first playoff round, commencing Feb. 23rd.
