## Companies Bidding for Town Pensions

Five insurance companies appeared before Stouffville municipal council Thursday evening to present plans for the establishment of a group pension plan for the town employees. Some eleven people would be eligible for the plan, including the employees of the Public Utilities Commission.

Basic provision of the plans is for a five percent pay deduction to be matched by five percent from employers.

At the conclusion of the presentations Reeve Timbers advised that when the necessary number of copies of each plan had been received, the employees would be called to a special meeting for a discussion on the pension, to be followed by a meeting of the finance commit-

### Heavy Use Of Sand

Road Supt. Davis advised Whitchurch Twp. council Monday that the municipality's entire stock of 2500 tons of sand had been used up and it was necessary to draw in sand direct from the pit at Gormley. He also stated that he had to provide an assistant at the pit, as Kenneth Baker had been injured and was unable to work.

Reeve Wallwork said that the sand shortage was becoming general in nearly every municipality. There had been considerable ice to attend to and residents were becoming more demanding in their requests for sanding service.

Council gave consent to snowplowing on certain roads not on the township system, but where the municipality was receiving some tax revenue.


