Dr. Crouch Rink Suffers First Defeat

Dr. Stuart Crouch's rink suffered their first defeat in five starts in last week's regular Wednesday night Men's League when they bowed to Walt Todd's quartet by a score of 8-6. The question asked voters in the February plebiscite was: "Are you in favor of the fluoridation of the water supply of this municipality?"

It is the first time the issue has been put to a vote in this district. Total eligible voters in the district is 700.
