

directly to metallic iron. "A process that would produce such a metallic iron has, for a long time, been a target of metcesses of this type are in existdifficult to implement or economically impractical."

In the process developed at Stelco, the iron ore is reduced in a horizontal rotary kiln by means of natural gas and coal. The reduction occurs in the solid state so that neither slag nor liquid metal is formed. A very close temperature control in the kiln is one of the essential requirements of the process. Such a temperature control is insured by judicious introduction of fuel along the whole length of the kiln and by very careful temperature measurements taken over the whole length of the furnace. Another essential requirement of the process is a proper particle size distribution

The metallic iron as discharged by the kiln is porous and is frequently referred to as sponge. This sponge can be used as feed for sieclmaking furnaces such as electric furnaces or oxygen converters or for ironmaking furnaces such as cupolas. 




