

ALL-STARS, UXBRIDGE, TIE 5-5

Lehman Fires Equalizer Before 1,200 Fans

As more than 1,200 fans roared their approval to an exciting exhibition hockey encounter in the Stouffville Arena on Friday night, Bud Lehman, a former Uxbridge rearguard, slipped Dave Jennings' rebound into the corner of the cage to give the Community League All-Stars a 5-5 tie with the "Black Hawks". With less than two minutes to go in the game, it marked a dramatic climax to a colourful contest.

Uxbridge spotted the All-Stars a two-goal lead in the first period only to stage a four-goal rally and move out front 4-2 early in the final frame. This set the stage for the All-Stars to battle back and earn a split in the points. Bud Lehman, Dave Jennings, Howard Forgie, Don Harman and Lawrence Gayman were the Stouffville marksmen. Art Rennick paced the Uxbridge attack with a hat-trick performance. Tommy Simpson and "Turk" Cornish counted singles.

Evenly Matched
There was little to choose between the clubs, although on the night's play, the All-Stars may have enjoyed a slight territorial edge. Their shooting was rather erratic at times however, and although goaltender Joe Carpenter handled 25 shots, as many more missed the target. Uxbridge showed up to good advantage when inside the Stouffville blue line. Led by the smooth skating Fred Etcher and the speedy Art Rennick, they juggled the puck around with picture plays. Stouffville starter, Jerry Bett blocked 12 shots. Relief netminder, Ross Madill stopped 1.

Sizzling Shots
It was no "picnic" between the pipes for anyone. The game was only a few minutes old, when Harold Hodgson rifled a "scorcher" that was gloved by Carpenter. It hurt his hand. In the third period, Matt Kinnari sized a torrid drive from left wing that made Carpenter wince as he took it in his glove.

He shook it off and play continued. At the other end of the rink, Jerry Brett made a dazzling stop on a goalmouth bid by Rennick. He turned in similar efforts on labelled shots from Fred Etcher and Paul Tomlinson. Madill's hardest direct drive came from the stick of Don Haynes. His finest effort came on a clean-cut breakaway by Etcher in the third period. Rennick took the rebound but hit the post.

Out of the Blue
The All-Stars were coasting along with a 2-1 lead when Uxbridge struck for three successive goals within 2 minutes and 17 seconds. Cornish, Simpson and Rennick scored in that order. Howard Forgie made it 4-3 and Dave Jennings evened the count one minute and 53 seconds later. At 10:45, Art Rennick sank his third of the contest. This set the stage for Bud Lehman to pot the equalizer at the 18:15 mark.

Aside from perhaps, Art Rennick, it would be difficult to select any one outstanding player, especially with the All-Stars. Jerry Brett amazed the fans with his acrobatic abilities and Dave Jennings performed exceptionally well. Howard Forgie, like rival, Etcher, made his every move count and Bob Atkinson led some dangerous rink-long rushes in spite of an injured leg.

Cherry Absent
If there could be a disappointing feature about such a successful venture, it would have to revolve around the absence of the versatile Bob Cherry. For two seasons, one of the Community League's most dazzling stars, the skillful puck-juggler was missing from the Uxbridge lineup. The All-Stars too, were without their one, big gun in Pete Lacey, currently on a sojourn to the SunnySouth. Defenceman, Ronnie Guy was also an absentee. The game was cleanly contested and all nine penalties were for minor offenses. Messrs. Rennick, Etcher,

Harman and Kinnari made the lucky draw selections.
