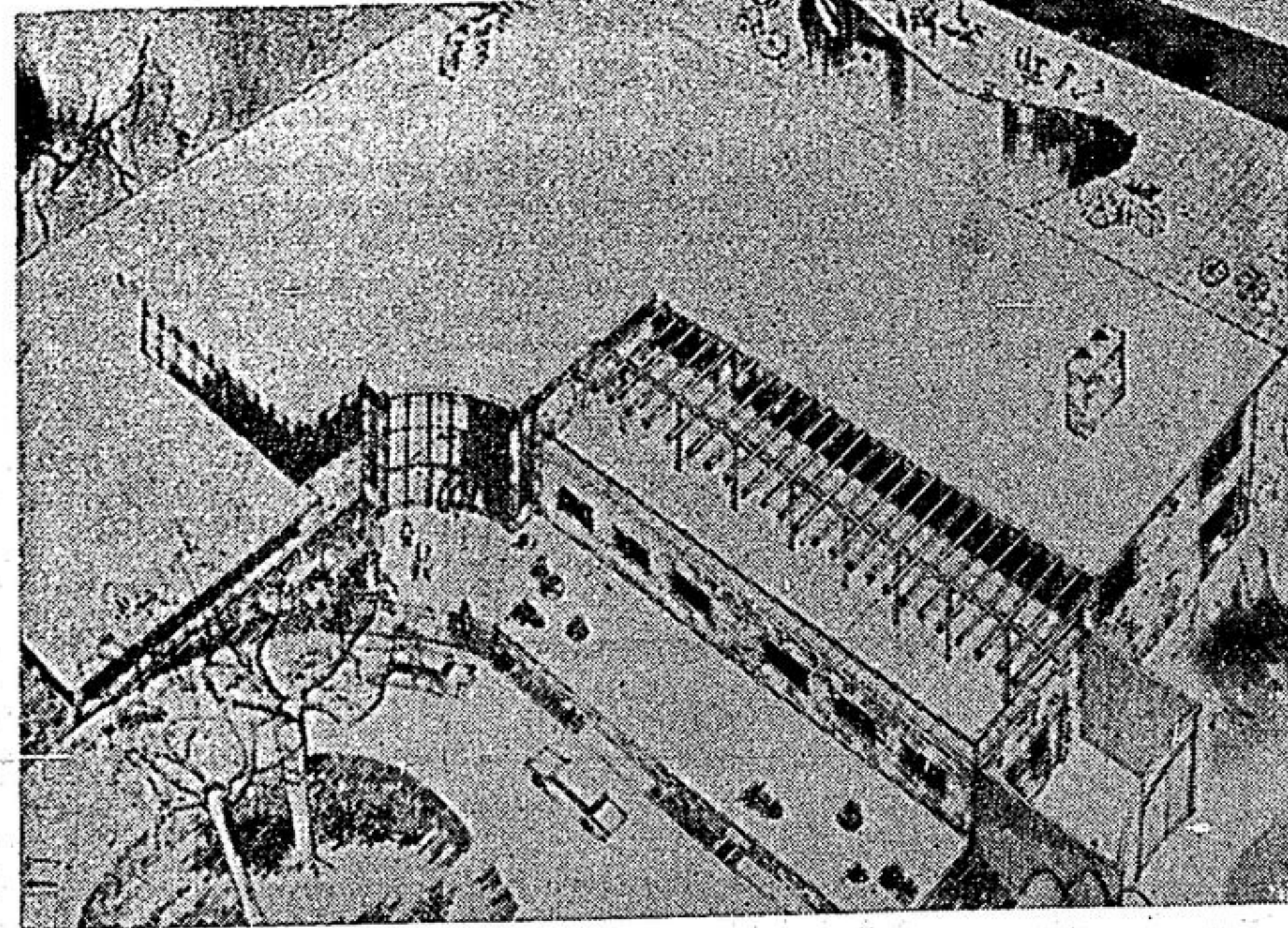


**Amphitheatre Under Construction On Claremont Farm**

Erected on the property of Mr. Robt. G. Roy, conc. 8, Pickering Township. All net proceeds from the project will go to the building of a Club House and a 150-bed Home for the Aged to be known as the IRENE MARGARET ROY MEMORIAL.



The Country Club will include a theatre with accommodation for 2,000 people. In addition, there will be playgrounds for the children, a swimming pool, tennis courts, an 18-hole golf course and facilities for skiing and skating. In case of inclement weather, performances may be held inside. A modern restaurant will serve the needs of the visitors. In the furtherance of the arts, both the theatre and the country club will be for the use of all, regardless of colour, creed or nationality.
