## Must Report To Council

Department officials, representing the Township of Pickering at Convention gatherings must, on their return, submit a report to Council in addition to an itemized expense account. This ruling, proposed by Councilor Milton Mowbray, was approved by other members. It was also agreed no Department Head would be permitted to attend more than one Convention in a calendar year. The issue was raised at a special meeting on Monday night after the Welfare Officer, Mr. A. W. Cane informed the Council that the two Conventions were scheduled for Timmins in June and in Niagara Falls in August. Both are 4-day gatherings. The Council agreed to allow the delegate an expense account up to \$125.00. Councilor, Hubert Wank contended that he would stand opposed to municipal representation at Conventions unless the delegate could bring something worthwhile back to the township. 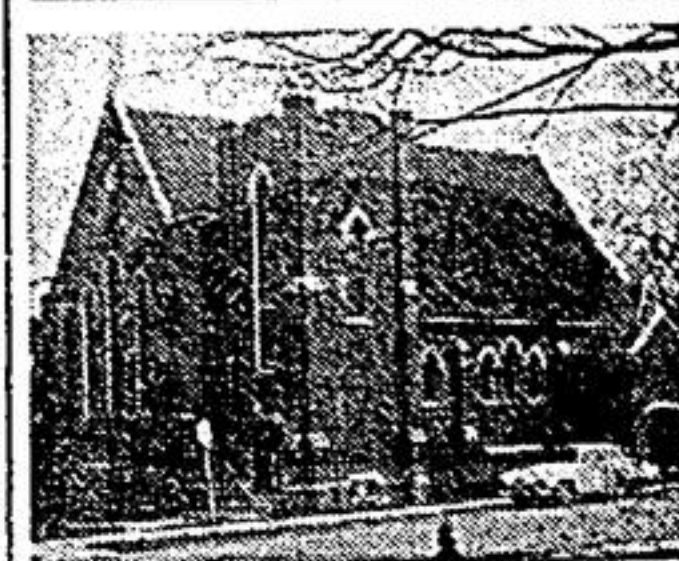
