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REPORT FROM PARLIAMENT

Talk of election seemed to have diminished somewhat on Parliament Hill this week.

Meanwhile, the House was winding up the Throne Speech debate, preparatory to dealing with a number of legislative items on the books in the name of the Government.

Among the items waiting to be dealt with was the legislation relating to the publication of financial statistics by both unions and companies. This measure stands in the name of the Minister of Justice and has been the subject of a good deal of comment.

Amendments were also coming forward to the Small Business Loans Act, a measure that has been instrumental in making loans available up to a ceiling of \$25,000 to small business enterprises across Canada.

The construction of a railway line in Gaspe is an item of major importance and will result in considerable industrial development which awaits the opening of this railway. This item stands in the name of the Minister of Transport.

Another important measure waiting to be dealt with is a broadening of the Farm Improvement Loans Act to place a ceiling of \$400,000,000 on the total amount of money which can be granted under this Act. It also extends the measure to June 30, 1965, and will empower the granting of a great number of loans up to that time. This measure stands in the name of the Minister of Finance.

A further extension is also provided through a measure also standing in the name of the Minister of Finance to the Fisheries Improvement Loans Act, which will be of considerable

benefit to fishermen on both coasts, bringing the provisions of this Act up to June 30, 1965, also.

There is also a measure dealing with Canada's transactions with the International Monetary Fund, which has been causing discussion in recent weeks.

Then there are Estimates of all departments still to come, during the discussion of which Parliament will have the opportunity of debating and examining the expenditures of the departments headed by various Ministers.

Another measure on the books provides for payment of certain provincial taxes and fees by Crown corporations.

All of these measures will, no doubt, receive exhaustive discussion in the House, owing to their intrinsic importance and to the bearing which the monetary items will have on the economy in general.

The departmental estimates, of course, are thoroughly discussed and examined in each session and receive careful consideration on the part of the majority of members.

Therefore, there is still a great deal of important and urgent business before the present session; and this of course does not take into account further measures which the Government may bring down from time to time.

A number of measures were indicated in the Throne Speech, some of which have yet to appear on the Order Paper.

In addition, there are, of course, a great many private bills which take up an hour of the time of the House on every day of the week and, in the past, have given rise to interesting and informative debates.
