Seeking CNR Dayliner Toronto to Lindsay

Although all passenger train service north of Markham Village has been withdrawn from the local C.N.R. line, some town officials, particularly in Lindsay, are still striving to inaugurate a dayliner schedule to serve the Toronto-Lindsay route. At the present time, one evening passenger unit comes as far as Markham and returns on the same night. It is even questionable how long this practice will continue.
Recently the Mayor of Lindsay, Joseph C. Holtom discussed Transport in Ottawa. The delegation of three included the warden of Victoria County, John Alton. The Minister promised the visitors that "he would look into the matter right away".
Mayor Holtom informed Department officials that more than a half-century ago, the people of Lindsay and Victoria County had invested more than \$200,000 in municipal debentures to bring the railway into the area and they contended that the C.N.R. was still obligated to provide some passenger service. It was suggested that the whole matter should be reviewed by the Dept. of Transport and that the C.N.R. should institute a Toronto to Lindsay dayliner on a six month trial basis.

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
