Uxbridge Netminder Stops 41 "Clipper" Shots

First-string netminder, Neil Wannamaker was back between the pipes in the Uxbridge cage on Friday night and his exhibition of puck-stopping skills enabled his team to grab the series lead over the Stouffville Clippers in the current group hockey finals. Uxbridge posted a hard-fought 5-3 victory before 365 fans.

Stouffville forwards "poured" the pucks at the Uxbridge "masked marvel" but he would yield only two drives by Barry Gaston, Grant Foreman and Barry McLean. Garry Geer, Mike Gray, Garry Jackson, Jack Redshaw and Bill Clarke were the Uxbridge marksmen.

Stouffville's shots were many but they lacked the velocity packed by many Uxbridge sharp shooters. Glenn Jackson blocked 27. Wannamaker stopped 41.

Jack Redshaw actually fired the "clincher". It came at the two minute mark of the final frame at a time when it appeared possible that Stouffville might rally and tie the score. Garry Geer made it 5-2 before Barry McLean split the Uxbridge defences for the "Clippers" final effort.

Stouffville pulled out all the stops in the last minutes of play when two Uxbridge players, Keith Stewart and Garry Jackson were whisked off to the cooler. With Glenn Jackson on the sidelines in favour of a 6th attacker, the Clippers swarmed around the Uxbridge end zone but couldn't hit the target.

Mike Gray continued to pose as Uxbridge's most potent scoring threat. The free-wheeling forward was held to one tally but assisted on Geer's goal. Barry McLean was best for Stouffville.

Dear Mr. Editor: In the Bell Telephone Company's present plan to join Unionville and Markham exchanges with Stouffville and Gormley exchanges, there appears to be a considerable lack of vision and fairness. Anyone who knows the habits of the people in the south half of Markham Township is aware that there is very little exchange of business or social life between this area and Whitchurch Town-

On the other hand, a good many Markham Township residents are former Toronto people and many work or attend school in the Metropolitan area. Much time and money would be saved, if Unionville and Markham exchanges were given Toronto toll-free calling privileges. According to information from the business office of the Bell, Markham Township's sister township on the west side of Yonge St. - Vaughan - enjoys a toll-free calling area to Toronto which extends as far north as the Richvale sideroad on the Yonge St. side, and to Woodbridge and Kleinburg on the northwest. Even Malton, some distance beyond Woodbridge,

has toll-free calling to Toronto. In conversation with Mr. Bill Barnes, area manager for the Bell, a protest was made with regard to the company's expressed intention to switch longstanding Axminster-3 customers In the Buttonville area to the proposed Unionville exchange

(with dial service). Mr. Barnes explained the move by saying: "We must be fair to all our customers. Why should one customer be allowed Ax3 service when his neighbor is allowed only Unionville serv-

Ice?" Very well! Considering the situation from the standpoint of fairness alone, we ask the Bell Telephone Co. to extend to Mar-

Uxbridge Takes Strangle-Hold On Junior Title; Wins In Final Seconds

Mike Gray, a fleet-footed Uxbridge leftwinger, will never win any medals for his prowess as a backchecker, but park the puck on his stick at centre ice and he's goal-bound with all the drive of a junior "Rocket" Richard. He proved this one week ago when he sank the overtime winner. He turned the trick again on Tuesday night with fifteen seconds left in regulation time. Disorganized play continued to plague the "Clippers" throughout the second frame and they were two goals behind as the teams headed into the final period. Jack Raymond made it 4-3 and Allan Boyd, playing his best game of the current playoff series, evened the count at 17:15. As 265 fans settled back to await the excitement, Gray teamed up with his pivot playmaker, Gary Jackson to fire the winner. Grant Foreman was the other Stouffville goal-getter, his second in two games.

Worthy Winners

On the night's play, Uxbridge were the better club. Stouffville appeared to come on much stronger in the third period and could possibly have won the contest if it had gone into overtime. The Clipper defence, on the other hand was "caught with its pants down" on a number of occasions. On Gary Geer's second goal. there wasn't a Stouffville man within fifteen feet of the rightwinger when he slapped Gray's goalmouth pass into the twine. It wasn't until ten minutes had gone by that Stouffville tested Wannamaker with a single shot. Stan Feasby bounced one off his pads from the blueline.


