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REPORT FROM PARLIAMENT

On Monday, the Minister of Justice, Mr. Fulton, brought before Parliament, Bill No. C-38, "a bill to provide for the reporting of financial and other statistics relating to the affairs of corporations and labour unions carrying on activities in Canada."

Mr. Fulton summarized the provisions of the legislation in the following words:

"First, the reporting requirement in the new bill will in general apply to all companies, whether owned or controlled in Canada or abroad, and whether public or private. The bill makes a number of specific exclusions, principally small companies and companies already reporting similar information to the Government under some other statute. Second, all labour unions will be required to make returns, whether or not their headquarters are situated outside Canada. Third, the range of information to be reported has been considerably extended, as compared with that in the previous bill, in order to give a clearer picture of the extent, and particularly, the effect of foreign control."

"Fourth, the information is segregated into two clearly defined classes. The first class will include information that will be available to the public; the second class, which will be for Government use only, will include those items whose public disclosure could be damaging to companies competitively . . ."

"Fifth, the initial year for reporting will be 1962, instead of 1960 as in the previous bill."

Mr. Fulton went on to say that it had been considered as a possibility "to exempt Canadian owned and controlled companies and unions. This, however was felt to be impractical. After all, there are many different means and degrees of control . . ."

The Minister of Justice described the bill as "an important part of the Government's national policy." He went on to say this: "Canadians are becoming increasingly aware of their nationhood, nor is it anti-Americanism. It represents the determination of the Government to understand fully the operation of our economy, the extent of foreign control of various units operating within that economy and the effects of that control; and our desire to see that the Canadian people are made aware, in general terms, of these facts and their implications."

The Minister of Justice then said: "One reason for the fundamental importance of this proposed legislation is the extent of foreign investment in the Canadian economy."

"Total non-resident investment in Canada as of 1959 amounted to no less than \$20.7 billion."

"In December, 1957, the most recent date for which these figures are available, more than half of all Canadian manufacturing industry was under non-resident control, as were 76 percent of Canada's petroleum and natural gas industry, and 61 percent of our mining and smelting industry . . ."

"Obviously any sovereign nation must have access to financial information on the operations of industry within its borders. Foreign investment in Canada is so extensive and has such a far-reaching effect upon the national economy that information on its activities is essential to the conduct of public affairs."

The Minister of Justice made it plain that Canada welcomed and "cordially invited" foreign capital to participate in development of resources; nevertheless it was proper for Canadians to have full information as to the extent of that participation.

With regard to labour unions, he said this: "It is only to be expected that foreign-controlled labour organizations should also divulge general information on their affairs in this country."

It was pointed out in the recent Canadian Labour Congress brief to the Government that the Congress objected in principle to unions and corporations being treated on the same basis.

At the same time, the Congress pointed out that secrecy surrounding company operations had been a disability in collective bargaining negotiations.

The Congress added, with regard to the proposed legislation, "We are prepared to live with it because we have nothing to hide."

With regard to unions, the Minister of Justice said this: "Labour unions affected by the legislation will be required to provide similar kinds of information, also divided into the two parts, (confidential and non-confidential). In Section "A", they will furnish a copy of their constitution, name and address of each local union or branch in Canada, information on trusteeships, a list of employers in Canada with whom they have a collective agreement; and the name, address and nationality of each officer and employee of the union resident in Canada, with the obvious exception of clerks and stenographers; together with information on the manner of selection or appointment of these persons."

"Section "B", the confidential part of the return, will include the union's financial statements, and a classified statement showing separately the amounts paid to a union with headquarters outside Canada . . ."

This bill has been adopted in principle by the House of Commons and discussion is proceeding on the various clauses in the bill. It is expected that each clause will be given careful scrutiny.

In 1837, when the Province of Upper Canada, which included Ontario, stagnated under the self-seeking rule of a clique known as The Family Compact, William Lyon Mackenzie rebelled. He began his famous march from near the centre of what is now York North riding.

His protest for progress, though defeated at the time, brought Lord Durham from England to study the causes — and responsible government came into being.

In 1867, Canada became a nation and for the next 90 years grew and prospered. Landmarks in this progress include the 1931 Statute of Westminster which gave Canada final sovereignty — and Canada became a member of the League of Nations. In 1947, Canadian citizenship was defined as distinct from British citizenship. Two years later, Canada obtained authority to amend the British North America Act, and thus appeals to the Imperial Privy Council were abolished.

Three years later, in 1952, Canada appointed its first Canadian Governor-General, the Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey. By such steps Canada moved proudly to nationhood and independence — and under the post-war leadership of the Liberal Government to a position of world influence. In 1948, Mr. Pearson was one of the architects of N.A.T.O. (the North Atlantic Treaty Organization) which defended devastated post-war Europe from the Communist threat, and laid the foundation for its present prosperity. Canada took a respected place in the United Nations; its opinions sought and influence acknowledged by all free nations.

It started in 1957

Beginning in 1957, when the Conservative Party assumed office, something began to happen to Canada's influence and prestige. Under Diefenbaker, Canada seemed to lose its sense of high purpose. The apathy of the government was reflected in a lagging economy, but even worse our justifiable pride in Canada's achievements, and in its representatives, was stung severely.

Canada must be freed from the Diefenbaker doldrums. Her voice must rise again in the councils of nations — and be respected. Our pride in Canada must be restored so that we can go forward with faith in our future.
