What To Do In An Accident

First aid training is like not having a seat belt in your car. You don't miss it until you need it and it isn't there.



What is even worse than lack of first aid knowledge, however, is the harm done by well-meaning persons to accident victims in the mistaken belief they were helping them.

One of the first "don'ts" listed by the Red Cross for citizens lending a hand at automobile accidents is don't move an injury victim unless it is absolutely necessary. If the injured person has to be moved, then don't roll them over or twist them around. Pull them either head or feet first while a second person supports the other end of the body. This is to avoid aggravating internal injury.

Shock is almost always a result of injury and the best first aid procedure is to keep the victim comfortable and warm. If bones are broken, don't move the limbs involved while you await the arrival of an ambulance.

Bleeding should be stopped with a clean cloth pad and burns should be protected from the air by the same method to lessen pain.

Head injuries often bring unconsciousness and the victim should be kept quiet and lying down. If the victim isn't breathing, artificial respiration is necessary immediately.

Observance of these simple procedures until medical help arrives can save a lot of suffering and perhaps even a life.

INSTALLATIONS OF SIRENS PROCEEDING

Richmond Hill, Vaughan and Markham Police Departments have lost their RED telephones. Nobody, apparently, is grumbling about suspected favouritism with Newmarket's Department retaining the one installed there.

The telephones were installed as an interim means of giving warning to those municipalities in which red sirens are installed. The Phase One siren system is now complete and control circuits to activate these sirens have been grouped by Counties. All sirens would be sounded, when required, from one central location. Therefore, the necessity for the special telephones has disappeared.

Points where the sirens still have to be manually activated retain the telephones. Twelve telephones are being retained in the Province-wide RED system of warnings, and seventeen are being removed.
