## Uxbridge Headed For Junior Title

Before a surprisingly small crowd of only 221 fans, Uxbridge Juniors defeated Hensall 3-1 on Uxbridge ice Tuesday night. The attendance, the smallest of the entire playoffs, was blamed on the televised Chicago-Toronto contest.

The victory gave Uxbridge a two-game lead in their bid for the all-Ontario Title. They took the series opener 7-5.

It was the trio of Gary Jackson, Gary Geer and Mike Gray that sparked the Uxbridge front-line attack. Geer enjoyed a good night with one goal and two assists. Gray and Jackson each fired singles.

Hensall grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first period but Uxbridge roared back with a pair in the second and one in the third. Neil Wannamaker in the Uxbridge net played brilliantly. Forward Ron Stewart, Jack Redshaw, John Taylor and Ron James also performed well for the winners.

In the series' first game, Gary Jackson led his Uxbridge team with two tallies. Singles came from the sticks of John Taylor, Gary Geer, Ron James, Jack Redshaw and Mike Gray.

# Ringwood Retains League Crown

Termed the greatest combination of hockey talent in the four-year history of Stouffville Community League competition, Ringwood completed a 4-game sweep of the series final against Markham on Friday night to return the trophy to the "Circle City" hamlet for a second successive season. In turning back the Markham club by an 11-5 count on Friday, the champions collected a total of 43 goals in four contests. The Arena Trophy was presented to the Ringwood club captain, Harold Hodgson by Erle Lehman, President of the Company.

"We were outclassed," commented Morris Proczko, Coach of the "Aces". Ringwood players praised the effort put forth by a number of Markham men, particularly Bob Graham, "Nebbie" Gayman, Rod McArthur and Clarence DeGuerr. "Graham (Bob) is a great player and a good sport," stated Ringwood rearguard, Don Haynes, a star in his own right. Neminder, Ross Madill suggested that the Markham leftwinger had one of the hardest shots in the league. "Gayman was great, too," commented another Ringwood supporter. "Don't think we don't know it," agreed defenceman, Haynes.

In the four-game encounter, Markham produced 21 goals. "At 5 goals per game, it should be enough to win most series," suggested Don Haynes. He agreed that the sensational save made by Ross Madill off Bob Graham near the midway mark

of the third period was the turning point in the contest. Gayman set Graham up with a perfect pass but Madill outguessed him with a brilliant stop. On the return rush, Jake Harman netted Ringwood's seventh tally and the winners never looked back.

"Aces" Short-handed  
The Markham club that boasted good bench strength throughout the regular schedule, were missing some of their best performers for Friday's final. Bob Atkinson, who suffered a nasty four-stitch cut over his left eye in a previous game, was never able to get back into action although he watched from the sidelines. Al Tidbury was cut for 8 stitches in the first period. He was treated by Dr. Robt. Seaver in Markham but returned to see the finish of the game. Dave Jennings, one of the "Aces" leading lights during the schedule, was on the absentee list along with Lina Borean, Harry Young, Geo. Carey and Jim Harrison. Clarence DeGuerr, sub-neminder with Markham, was actually one of the heroes in a losing cause. He was pelted with 41 shots in the third game and blocked an additional 54 in Friday's final.

Bud Lehman and Mike McStravick were each two-goal marksmen from Ringwood. Singles came from the sticks of Jake Harman, Harold Hodgson, Pete Goodfellow, Earl Thompson,

Matt Kinnari, Bruce Fockler and Don Haynes. Carl Keffer and Lawrence Gayman each potted a pair for the "Aces". Ron Graham scored the other.

Returns To Action  
If any individual was in the spotlight of fan attention, it was Markham's Carl Keffer. Except for a run-in with an over-exuberant Ringwood roofer, he played the game hard, but clean. It was his first return to action following a two-game suspension. In the third period, he engaged in a running feud with Ringwood's Bud Lehman but nothing developed. He was the first to congratulate the Ringwood winners at the conclusion of the contest. He fired two of his team's five tallies.

On several occasions he was jeered by the crowd, then cheered for his scoring efforts. Three times he was "rolled" off his skates by Ringwood's Ronnie Guy but he never attempted to retaliate. His performance was the subject of much discussion in both teams' dressing rooms after the game.

Arrives Late  
Defenceman, Bud Lehman arrived at the game in the third period after a day-long trip to and from Alliston. In twenty minutes of play he counted two goals and assisted on two others. He enjoyed a good season with the Ringwood squad and contacted few penalties, during the

schedule or in the playoffs. His two tallies on Friday came only two minutes apart. Blueline mate Don Haynes was also great in an offensive role with 1 goal and 5 assists. A break-down of the scoring summary is as follows:
