Uxbridge Player Suspended for Stick Swinging Attack

Ron James, fiery leftwinger with Uxbridge in O.H.A. Junior "D" ranks, has been suspended indefinitely as the result of a stick-swinging attack against a rival player at the conclusion of a playoff final game in Uxbridge on Saturday night.

The incident occurred so unexpectedly that few persons among the 700 present knew what had happened. It touched off a brawl among some of the more rabid fans and officers of the Uxbridge town police department had to be called in to separate the pugilists. No arrests were made.

The game had ended prior to the skirmish and some Uxbridge players were in the midst of

offering congratulations to their victors on a hard-fought overtime 6-3 win. The hand-shakes came to a sudden end when James suddenly wheeled and brought his stick down with resounding force. Referee, Jack Shropshire was quoted as saying that the blow, if it had hit the player on the head, could have been fatal. The official immediately tagged James with a match misconduct penalty.

It is possible that the Uxbridge player could be through for the season. Prior to the game on Wednesday night, the series was deadlocked at two games apiece. Jackson, McMillan and Ron Stewart were the marksmen for the homesters.

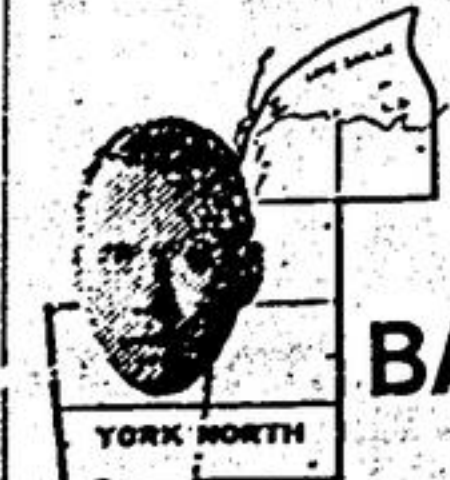
Then Mr. Newman adds: "The Canadian plan amounts to little more than a belated bow to the bold initiative of President Kennedy's trade expansion act."

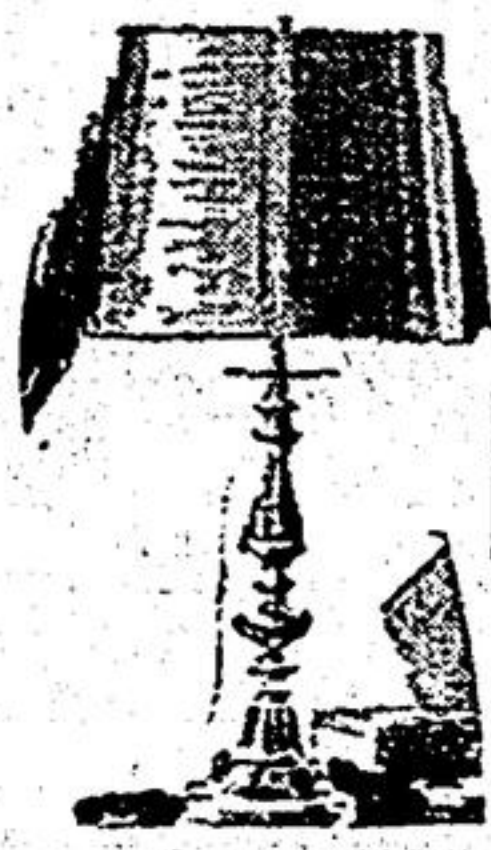
