This entirely new type of vaccine may be the key to complete eradication of polio-

myelitis from the community. The new vaccine now made available by the Province of Ontario is a pleasant tasting syrup preparation that will be given on plastic spoons at special 26. Mrs. George Richardson, 1st clinics located across the County. It will be offered to all school children, with parents' consent, in elementary and sec ondary schools during school hours. Children not in school, and parents and other adults in the community will be offered the vaccine in special evening clinics strategically located in each community. The schedule of clinics will be published next week.

The new vaccine acts more quickly to confer its protection than all previous vaccines for this purpose. It is hoped that it will eliminate carriers of wild polio virus and thus prevent unwitting spread of polio infection in the household or community.

For best results it should be given to an entire household, or better still to the entire community, within a short space of time. For this reason York County Health Unit has set up a schedule of school and community clinics to begin operation as soon as the vaccine i received early in May. This will permit administration to every one in the County before the end of May when the polio sea son normally starts.

All health departments in York County, including Metropolitan Toronto, are co-operating to provide the new Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine at approximately the same time in May. This will be the first dose of the new vaccine in this area. A second dose will be scheduled for early in the Fall. It is hoped to cover the entire population of our work. the County with this program. Swimming Pools-

We must not limit the world's hostility to the physical. It may also apply to other areas. For example, the sneer of the cynic, the thinly veiled contempt of some worldlings, and the chilling indifference of other unbelievers all cause genuine grief to him who seeks to live with eternity's values in view. The Heart of the Lesson-

The theme of Peter's First Epistle is a double one, and concerns both suffering and glory. The present conflict is in view of future compensation, and the trial is designed as training for the coming age.

Our Lord Himself trod this path. Peter was a personal witness of Christ's sufferings, and was also a sharer of His coming glory (see chap. 5:1). He emphasizes that the cross always precedes the crown. The evening, as well as the morning, make up one day (see Gen. 1:5).

Now, the Christian's sufferings may flow from one of two sources. They may descend upon him because of his own misdeeds. Or, again, they may stem from his fidelity to Jesus Christ. The former brings embarrassment and shame; the latter triumph.

Because God constantly cares for us, we are to cast all our care upon Him (see 1 Pet. 5:7). 
