CAFIK TO CARRY LIBERAL BANNER IN ONT. RIDING

Norman Cafik, a dark-horse candidate, has been selected to lead the Liberal party in Ontario County in the Federal election. In a Convention, attended by more than 300 in Brooklin last week. Mr. Cafik, a Pickering Twp. resident, won out over John Lay of Pickering Village in an upset vote.

In addressing the Convention, both Mr. Lay and Mr. Cafik had little criticism against the sitting member, Michael Starr, Minister of Labor. "He cannot be underestimated," said Mr. Cafik, "for he is well liked, well respected and is no man's fool." "I don't think there is anyone who knows him that does not like him," agreed Mr. Lay.

Mr. Cafik promised to embark on a rigorous campaign, unprecedented in Liberal history in the riding.

Many Unpaid Accounts For Snow Plowing

Road Supt. E. Davis reported to Whitchurch Twp. council on Monday that he had outstanding accounts on his books for plowing private lanes dating back as far as 1948. Along the same line, residents were now required to pay for culverts into their homes before installation.

Councillor Ivan McLaughlin suggested the snow-plowing be handled the same way. However, the Road Supt. said this would be hard to do as it was never known how long the plow would be required.

It was suggested that files be consulted before attending a call to see if the account was in arrears. General opinion was that the person calling would not like to wait while there was an "audit of the books."

No decision was reached on how to curb these delinquent accounts but council was agreed that with the increased municipal work, the plowing of private drives should be left to some private concern.

Higher Relief
 Council in past years considered that \$4,000 was a top figure for any single month's relief and nursing home care. However, the 1962 figures have far passed this amount. February relief and hospital care accounts paid totalled \$5,796; March was \$5,153 and April was \$4,026.

Some Protest New Site For Dump
 A deputation comprising Mr. Smedman, Mr. Miller and Mr. Lloyd, from the area of the 7th concession of Whitchurch Twp., north of the Aurora road, appeared before township council Monday night to protest the location of the new township dump.

Mr. Sedman said that in building his home he considered he had picked a quiet well regulated district. He now found he had a scrap dealer and a family living in a basement for neighbors, and latest of all it was proposed to establish a dump nearby.

Reeve Wallwork assured the deputation that the agreement governing the dump had to be satisfactory to the Health Unit and he would see that it was not a detriment to the area.

Each member of the group was provided with a copy of the bylaw and accepted the assurance that the dump would be operated properly.
